What is going on?

Parish News has received this from the Highways Agency, Investors in People:

Ongoing Closures to the B4540 Church Road Slip End

The existing closure of the B4540 Church Road at Slip End has now been extended to November 2006. We had originally planned to reopen Church Road at the end of **July 06** to allow work to start on rebuilding the Slip End Lane bridge. It was then planned to have further subsequent closures to complete the works on Church Road.

However, we have now agreed to the contractor rescheduling his programme so that he can complete all the works on Church Road in one go before it is reopened. The total period of time over which Church Road will be closed will remain the same but this will now be over one continuous block rather than over two or more separate periods. Slip End Lane will not be closed until Church Road has been re-opened to traffic.

Vegetable Garden

A new year will soon be upon us and this season's harvest should be gathered, making the ground ready for winter sweetening. Beet, carrots and potatoes can be lifted and stored, the carrot and beet in boxes of sand or under mounds of earth in the open, potatoes in clamps. Parsnips are better left in, the frost improves them: they can be pulled as required. Cauliflowers should have a leaf put over each head to protect, and if not done earlier, onions bent over from close to the heads. Seedlings of spring cabbage can be planted into growing quarters. Young cauliflowers can go into frames (in pots) for safety during winter.

Flower & Fruit Garden

Cut back raspberry canes to 1ft above the ground, plant new strawberry beds, keep an eye on apples and pears, continue to pick them as soon as they are ripe.

Plant early spring bulbs, transplant shrubs and prune roses of old wood. Hardy annuals may be sown outdoors to stand the winter.

General Work

Keep the ground loose by hoeing; turn over any ground cropped, watch out for insects and their eggs burn rubbish as it accumulates.

Bedfordshire County Council's Review of the 3 Tier Education System

Parish News has published correspondence recently on this subject, so important to parents, children and the Bedfordshire school system. Richard Stay, our County Councillor and well-known to us in the Slip End area, has written words to express his point of view:

Bedfordshire County Council has been through a significant process of evaluating the performance of our education system in the County, prompted by a desire to drive up educational standards. To oversee that evaluation it established a Working Group comprising County Councillors from all political parties, Parent Governors, the Learning & Skills Council and representation from both the Anglican and Catholic churches. I sat as a member of this group because I hold the finance portfolio at County Hall.

The Working Group spent 9 months taking evidence from some very senior and experienced educational experts and it published its report in June this year. The key recommendations were very much focused on driving up standards, which we accepted were not as good as they should be in comparison with similar Counties. One of the recommendations was a change from a 3 tier to a 2 tier school system, which would have meant a school structure that had Primary and Secondary schools across the County.

The Working Group report went to the County Council's Executive on 27th June and was approved. The report then went on to full County Council on 13th July where Members did not feel able to support the change in structures. Therefore there will be no change to 2 tier education for the time being. However we still have a number of very significant issues to face in terms of under performing schools where our children are being let down and Councillors are determined to ensure that is where the focus of the LEA will be to drive up standards.

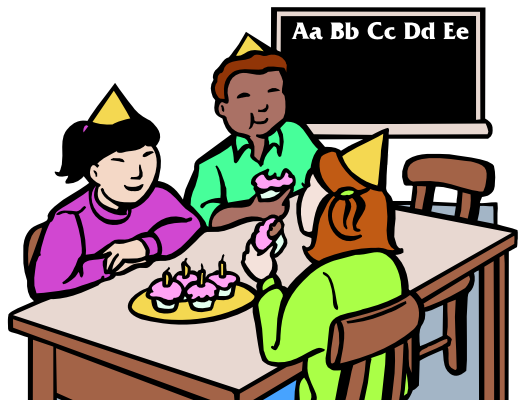
Looking ahead it is difficult to see how Bedfordshire can continue to be 1 of only 3 education authorities in the country that is wholly 3 tier, however that is unfortunately not on the table for discussion for the time being.

I supported a move to 2 tier for some very basic reasons; Bedfordshire schools are underperforming, the Key Stage exams are based on Primary and Secondary Schools and a change would have massively supported our many small rural schools, like Slip End Lower, that would have had two extra years added to them. Bedfordshire does not have a single school in the top 200 performing state schools in the country and at Key Stage 2 and 3 we are barely at national average, let alone on a par with Counties that have a similar socio-economic profile like Hertfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Cambridgeshire, Kent etc.

We are where we are, we clearly did not do enough to win the argument: I accept that, but I think we should all be concerned that the Bedfordshire education system will continue to provide education to our 63,000 students with one hand tied behind its proverbial back.

The one good thing that has come out of this debate is the collective desire to improve the standards to education in our schools; we can all agree on that and we will have to put off the inevitable change to structures for another day.

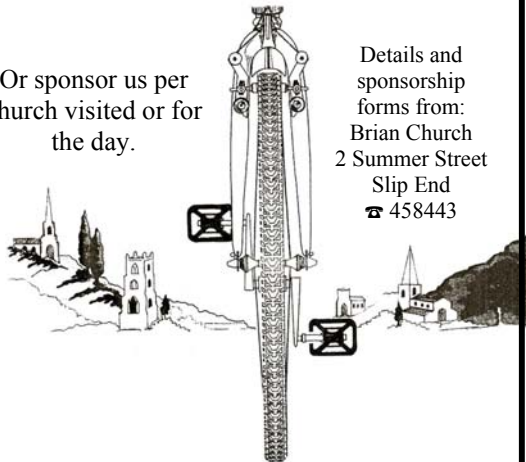

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2005 - 2006

Introduction

The Parish Council continues to pursue its overall objectives which are (a) to improve the quality of life for the residents of the village and the surrounding hamlets and (b) to provide services in the most efficient and cost effective manner. There are two changes in personnel to report on this occasion, in January our Clerk, David Haste, decided to retire and we have been carrying a vacancy on the Council for over a year. Nikki West, a resident in the village, has been appointed as the new Clerk and will take up her appointment on 1st August 2006. We extend our thanks to David Haste who has provided excellent services for the Parish Council for 5 years, and wish to point out that he remains Clerk to Hyde Parish Council. We would also like to thank him for the support he has given to The Playing Fields Management Committee, on a voluntary basis. Mrs Janet Crawley, of Front Street, will join the six members of the Council who were re-elected this May.

Coronation Gardens

Residents will have notice the works currently in progress. This has been the result of the untiring efforts of Councillor Geoff Daniel and his fellow members of a working group that have not only designed the new gardens but also worked very hard to find additional funding for the project. Thanks are due especially to Airparks Ltd and Slip End Garage for generous donations towards the cost of these works. The Parish Council will be providing about £5,000 for this work and it is hoped that the finished project will be pleasing to the eye and an asset to the village.

Dispute with County Council

The Parish Council has suspended its efforts to pursue the legal route over its dispute with the County Council concerning the Timberlands Travellers' site. Members are now

concentrating on the political route and are grateful for the continuing support of our County Councillor, Richard Stay, and our three District Councillors. While our long-term objective remains the closure of the site, which is not suited for its purpose, our short to medium term goal is to minimise the nuisance emanating from the site and if possible restrict its use to the older members of the travelling community.

Closed Circuit Television

Both systems (the Village Hall and the Playing Field) continue to operate with some degree of success. Both need some improvements, especially that at the field which will have to cater for the new tennis courts. Councillor Steve Fuell leads on these projects.

Crawley Playground

The Council are considering improvements to the playground and have set aside money for this purpose. It is unfortunate that considerable expenditure has been necessary to provide repairs to equipment caused by vandalism as well as fair wear and tear. This is very discouraging and very costly to local residents who end up paying for the work. We are obliged to have the equipment inspected on a regular basis and the recommendations of the Inspectors cannot be ignored. Members are also considering replacing the fence and gate in Markyate Road, another potentially expensive project.

Policing

We were sorry to learn of the departure of PC Carron Thompson, our beat co-ordinator for many years. Her replacement is PC Louise Howard. Our first Police Community Support Officer was also a victim of ill health and her replacement has been appointed. We have also had meetings with the Divisional Commander, our local Inspector, Steve Barrett, and the rural Sergeant, James Kinnear, who attends our meetings on a (fairly) regular basis. We have made known residents' strong views on the lack of policing in these parts which has

sometimes reached crisis proportions. In the view of the Parish Council a merger between Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire would be beneficial, in that we would be a central rather than a peripheral location.

M1 Widening

Residents are beginning to suffer inconvenience from this major project and matters will get worse before there is any real improvement. The Parish Council is working to minimise inconvenience to villagers and to ensure that there are no lasting problems in the form of parcels of land which invite illegal occupation. We have successfully argued for the extension of temporary speed limits in and around the village. Assurances have been given about the restoration of the original plaque commemorating the opening of the M1 more than 50 years ago.

Slip End Playing Field

Although not a direct responsibility of the Parish Council and a charity in its own right, the field is such an obvious benefit to the village that the Council have felt it necessary to offer continuing help to ensure its survival. This takes the form of administrative support through the Clerk, who attends meeting of the Management Committee and financial support when needed. Two of our members, Councillors Philip Penman and Steve Fuell, also take an active role on the Committee. As was said last year, the village needs the playing field but the playing field also needs the support of the residents if it is to survive. Vandalism is still a problem and a call to the police if any such behaviour is witnessed would be greatly appreciated.

Other Matters

The various items mentioned above form only a part of the work of the Parish Council. Members continue to battle to secure minor works and repairs to the fabric of the village, sometimes by the District or County Councils but often by the use of our own limited resources.

Sadly, we do not always get the improvements to the village which we seek; this year we put great effort into trying to obtain extra street lighting, but unfortunately our application was refused.

The Council provides grants for a number of local groups, especially those working with young people, and the playing field. Our Vice Chairman, Ken Crossett, is leading a project to secure a skateboard park for the village and the Council will consider giving support to this project once firm proposals are on the table.

Special Thanks

David Haste our Parish Clerk retired recently having been in post since Slip End Parish gained its own independent council. David has been of great assistance to us during the transition and we wish him well for the future. He will still be keeping his hand in, as he continues as Clerk to Hyde Parish Council. We are pleased to announce that the work begun by David Haste continues with the appointment of Nikkie West, who already makes her presence felt by keeping us councillors in check!

As you will have read, vandalism continues to be an issue, and certain places around the village appear to be a particular target, not least the bus stop at the cross roads. However, we extend our thanks to an unknown member of the public who painted over the graffiti at the bus stop recently. It is certainly heartening to see such community spirit!

Finally: Please don't forget That the Parish Council meets on the first Monday of every month (except August) in the Village Hall. If the first Monday is a bank holiday then we meet on the **second** Monday. Members of the public are welcome and will be given the opportunity to speak.
