### **Other News**

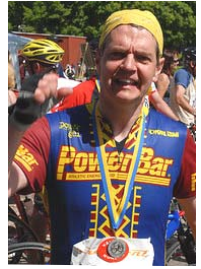

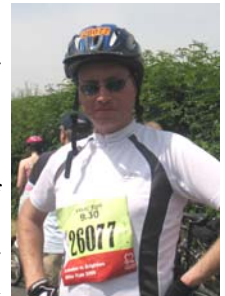

Two erstwhile Slip End boys, Paul Church and Simon Kingston took part in a couple of cycling events, both attracting many thousands of cyclists.

Paul has ridden in the "Vätternrundan" for some years now and this year over 15000 cyclists entered, young and old, male and female. The 190 mile route around Lake Vättern in Sweden is billed as the "world's largest recreational bicycle event". He won a silver medal for taking part five years running in this cycling event. In 2002 it took him just under 15 hours, and he has reduced the time it has taken him each year. In 2006 he set himself a target of less than 10 hours and completed it in 9 hours 47 minutes at an average speed of 19mph! Of course, this isn't a race, but as you can see from the photo there is a certain amount of satisfaction on achieving a personal goal!



The London to Brighton run is organised in aid of the British Heart Foundation and it too attracted many thousands of cyclists. Simon set off with 27000 others on the 54 mile route. Last year the event raised over £3m and hopes were that this would be beaten in 2006. It is so popular that entries were oversubscribed and thousands were unlucky.

Our meeting in June started with the introduction of this year's committee. It was like a case of "buy one get one free"; excuse my pun, as we are all the same as last year. Madame R. Weber gave us her account of this year's A.G.M. and we were reminded that it is on

this day W.I.'s countrywide were outside supermarkets demonstrating against the waste of too much wrapping of goods purchased.

Mrs. Brown was our speaker for the evening telling about her charity 'Babies in Prison'. Her friend married the Holloway Prison chaplain and this is how she became involved. In 1990 the cells were infested with rats, bugs, insects and filth. The pregnant women were taken to Whittington Hospital to deliver their babies, where they were restrained with handcuffs attached to the bed. Twice the Government was approached to change things, to no avail, but as an election came along the new

party in charge changed the law to have a policeman on guard outside the door. As the babies in prison were not allowed to crawl (it was too dirty) their growth suffered. Baby walkers take them outside the prison to get used to traffic noise, animals, crowds, rain and wind and to see the horizon! It certainly makes you think. When they have bonded with their mothers they are taken out of prison at 18 months

The disturbed prisoners were in cells above the babies' level. Taking the babies to the yard for air meant avoiding the rubbish which had been thrown through the bars. The "evening" meal was given at 3pm. as staff had to clear up.

The charity money raised goes towards Christmas presents, clothes, and trying to improve conditions.

*The Vegetable Garden July*

Continue to plant out winter greens as you clear ground of early crops, such as dwarf peas, early potatoes, as far as possible, choose showery weather for this work, if July is persistently dry. Push on with the planting and then water freely for a few days. Do not wait until disease attacks potatoes, spray them now with Bordeaux mixture. Spray the leaves top and bottom.

Peas should be gathered as soon as the pods are full or else they toughen. Picking also means a lengthening of the supply by allowing the late forming pods to mature. Pick beans- runner and French- as they become big enough. and so to assure more from the same plants. All root crops need attention for loosening earth, watering, hoeing weeds and digging out weeds that are deep rooted, burn these later.

*Flower & Fruit Garden*

Sow violas, pansies, wallflowers and columbine to give a show next spring. Layer carnations, pinning in with twigs and do not allow to get dry. Examine flowering plants regularly, removing faded blooms. This applies to roses, to early flowering herbaceous plants, bedding plants and annuals. Tulips and hyacinths will have completed growth and may be lifted and cleaned, lay the bulbs in shallow trays and store in a dry, cool, airy place.

Complete the thinning of apples and pears, reduce the fruit to one or two on each spur. Early apples and pears should be ready to pick.

*General Work*

Trim hedges when necessary to keep them neat and tidy, During this month and August when the weather is likely to be hot, it is an excellent plan to remove the grass box from the lawn mower, and let the tiny clippings lie on the lawn,. They will act as a mulch and will protect the roots from scorching.

Benign noises, such as the telephone or a cooker timer, are made known by pawing at his owner's arm.

***Coronation Gardens***

As you can see the refurbishment of Coronation Gardens at the crossroads is coming along and hope is that it will be completed by the end of the summer. The Council thanks Valerie Church, Karen Casoria and Pauline Smith for taking on such a large project on behalf of us all.

Clr. Geoff Daniel has taken the Councils brief for this project and we thank him as well and to the contractors, lead by Mark Short, a Slip End resident.

There are various projects being discussed for the Gardens, including flag poles, and name plates etc. If you have any unwanted plants or shrubs, please contact Val Church to see if they are needed.

***Rossway & St Andrews Close***

We have been working hard to get these two roads re-constructed. The problem has been the closure of the road because of the School. After some consultations with BCC we have managed to get agreement to do that work on the 26<sup>th</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup> July 2006. This means that the school will not be disrupted and there will be minimum problems for the residents. I should think that residents will be contacted with a view to removing any parked cars for these dates. We are looking for co-operation from the residents about the parked cars.

***New Parish Clerk***

We have great pleasure in announcing the engagement of our new Clerk. She is Nikki West, and she lives in the village. She officially takes over from David Haste in September. By that time she will have a dedicated phone line and an email address. Watch this space.

***Co-opted Parish Councillor***

By the time you read this we will hopefully have co-opted our seventh and final Parish Councillor. More information to follow.

It is said that a week is a long time in politics. A month can make all the difference in the running of a Parish Council. Following the "enough is enough" outcry within the community and articles which appeared in recent editions of Parish News about crime, vandalism and problem youths, we have been inundated with information from people across the Parish. All of this information has been passed onto the Police who have taken steps to counteract the recent crime-wave here.

We now have all the names of the Slip End Mafia: so 'Mafiosi', watch out. We have also been provided with the names of those involved in the crimes perpetrated at the Peter Edwards Playing Fields a couple of months ago. We also know who stole the golf carts and who hot wired and stole the dumper truck. And we know the owner of the White Mercedes van. The van in question has not been seen recently, are the owners on holiday or have they finally gone?

On the 15<sup>th</sup> May Police apprehended two youths stealing parts from cars in the village. They were taken to Dunstable Police Station, and along with another from Hemel Hempstead were remanded on bail pending further investigations. The two that were caught are from the village.

It seems that a lot of these problems were caused by a small band of young men who were ringleaders influencing younger teenagers, a sort of Alumni of crime giving tutorials on mayhem. How pathetic! I don't know about the rest of you, but when I was nearly 20 and had the means to get out of the village I lived in, you wouldn't see me for dust hanging around the bus stops and the village hall car parks largeing it with the younger kids.

Finally, a message to SEM: your names are known to us. To the offending young men and women I say: you will be pursued within the bounds of any Civil Laws and made to pay for all the damage you have done.

## ***Village Hall Car Park & Crawley Playground***

Most of you will have read Muriel's article in the last Parish News. Notices have gone up to the effect that the car park at the Village Hall is a private car park and only for use if visiting the Village Hall or accompanying children under 14 years of age using the Crawley Play Ground. The Crawley Playground has a Bye-Law covering usage, which states that no person over the age of 14 can use the playground unless they are accompanying children under that age. The bye laws also prohibit ball games, motor cycles or scooters or dogs and horses.

The cost of upkeep to the playground, rubbish collection and repairs has been borne by us all and steps are required to prevent mis-use of the Children's Playground. From now on, anyone over the age of 14 found in the playground and not complying with the regulations will be prosecuted and billed for any damage that may have occurred during their visit, whether they did it or not. This includes littering, graffiti and damage. We are now acting under Civil Law which as a Parish Council we are entitled to do to protect our interests on behalf of the Council Tax Payer.

It would be good to see more people at Parish Council meetings. With public attending in such small numbers, it is hardly surprising that truth gets distorted and speculation gets out of hand in the local pubs. Local discussion is great, but it would be better if this was done on a more informed basis, so any parishioner is welcome to attend the Parish Council meetings. If enough people are concerned about a specific matter, we are quite willing to move the Agenda around to introduce public discussion earlier on. The Agenda is not set in stone!!

## School's out for Summer but now what do we do?

*The World Cup, Wimbledon and the Tour de France might be inspiring children to get out and get active over the long summer holidays, but if you're like me you could be starting to wilt when your children expect you to provide endless sources of entertainment.*

Activities can be expensive. It is worth looking at for special deals or vouchers (Tesco clubcard points?) to make trips to Legoland or other amusement parks affordable. Tourist information centres and local papers often carry advertisements that include "child free with every paying adult" type deals. If you travel off peak a day out in London needn't be too expensive if you take a picnic rather than trying to eat out. A lot of the London museums have free entry, the Natural History Museum, Science Museum, Imperial War Museum and Museum of London to name but a few. Younger children actually find the train ride itself part of the fun.

Realistically, it is cheaper and less frazzling to try trips closer to home. Both Woodside Wildlife Park and Stockwood Park are within walking distance of the village. As well as its animals, Woodside has fun attractions like the helter-skelter and bouncy castle. It also has an indoor play area.

Parish News has highlighted some of the attractions of Stockwood Park in a previous issue. They are running a Seaside at Stockwood theme over the summer with drop in activity sessions held regularly for a modest fee. There is also a Living History weekend planned for 22 and 23 July where the Sealed Knot will set up camp and re-enact a battle from the Civil War. More information at [www.luton.gov.uk](http://www.luton.gov.uk). The same website will give you information about events at the Library Theatre in Luton which is showing some good plays aimed at children.

At the Wardown Park Museum in Luton an exhibition is running which may be of some

interest to those of us who try to understand the way of life of some of our neighbours. The museum is hosting an exhibition devoted to gypsy and travelling people which runs until August 27th. Also, at Stockwood there is a horse-drawn gypsy caravan on permanent display and, on dates in August, Craft Days will be held there.

Other fairly local places where children can enjoy a walk and a roam around include Ivinghoe Beacon – fantastic views reward the stiff climb to the top and Dunstable Downs – best place for kite flying.

The Priory Gardens and Heritage Centre in Dunstable is well worth a visit. Find out more at [www.dunstable.tv/whatson/Dunstable](http://www.dunstable.tv/whatson/Dunstable) where there is a list of events including bands appearing in the Garden on Sundays (Manshead appear on 9 July).

Other places we've enjoyed include the Walter Rothschild Zoological Museum at Tring, which we call the stuffed animal museum – visit and the reason why becomes clear – and Pitstone Green Museum of Rural Life – only open on 9 July, 13 August, August Bank Holiday and 10 September. 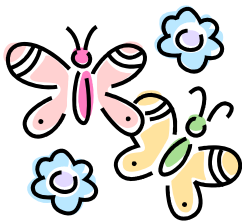
Verulamium Museum in St Albans is a must see for anyone interested in the Romans. They have monthly mosaic making and a talk by a Roman legionary who is alarmingly convincing. Events are planned for National Archaeology weekend on 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> July. More information may be found at [www.stalbansmuseums.org.uk](http://www.stalbansmuseums.org.uk). The Museum is next to the lovely Verulamium Park which has a lake with ducks, etc. to feed, a playground and a fantastic splash park which is a delight for younger children.



To be honest, I think my children would probably vote for two months of television and computer games. To keep them from turning into couch potatoes I keep a list of activities in a notebook which I delve into when I am feeling desperate. Here are a few of the ideas. Have a day with a theme: say it's space, you could let them make rockets out of old boxes to fly to the moon and make a mobile of planets, etc for their room. You could bake moon cakes (recipe on the BBC Big Cook Little Cook web page if you need one), or cook astronaut's breakfast for tea (That's what my mum called steak, egg and chips, was she just tricking me??)

As well as junk modelling, you could try getting them to build a structure using only rolled up newspaper, or making picture frames from card decorated with pasta and string. The CBBC and CBeebies websites at [www.bbc.co.uk](http://www.bbc.co.uk) have masses of ideas.

Let the children put on a show for family and friends. They can tell jokes, recite a poem, dance or play a musical instrument. It is surprising how much time can be spent on rehearsals, stage design, creating the programme before you even get to the performance for duly appreciative uncles, aunts, grandparents, or anyone else you can bribe to sit through it.



Make the garden more interesting for kids. Send them on a bug trail. They could do this in the park or in the hedgerows too. It is amazing how fascinated a child can

be by a woodlouse! Also, children nowadays are brilliant at research so once they have found things, be it bugs or weeds, let them investigate what it is they've found.

We have also hosted our own highland games in a back garden the size of a pocket hankie. Sports such as 10 yard space hopper bounce, toss the caber (a Smartie tube) and welly-

wanging were hotly fought and medals awarded.



When I was a little girl, Tuesday afternoon was for baking. I have lovely memories of culinary delights which in reality were probably just grey

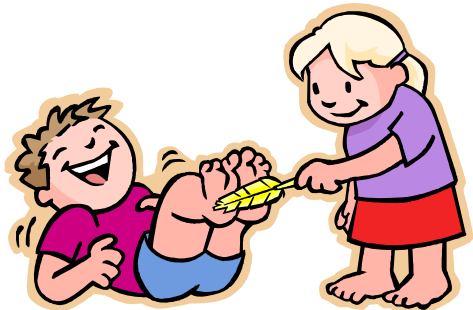
