

M1 - THE MONSTER STIRS

The monster has been benignly alongside us for many years, but we are now becoming aware of the invasive nature of how increased road traffic wrecks our country side. Reference to the Highways Agency website:

www.highways.gov.uk/roadsprojects/4478.aspx

will reveal positive spin but little reality and even less detailed information about how the immense widening project is affecting us on the ground. The map posted on the site cannot be any less vague and it is impossible to relate to the way our countryside is being ripped apart in the horrendous area around junction 10.



The project has been in the planning stages for many months, perhaps years. I can recall very little in terms of information forthcoming from government, Highways Agency, contractors or anybody, over that time. We knew, but vaguely, that the wretched road was to be widened in our area. Sadly, we have come to expect little or no consultation where such major developments are just imposed on those unfortunate to be in the way. However, this does not excuse the “zero information” policy which pervades.

Was it made known to us that such a mess would be made during construction? How much worse will it things get when construction really gets underway, especially in the Pepperstock and Church Road areas? Why is it that only now we are told that Church Road is to be closed *for six months when this imposition must have been known to the authorities for months, perhaps years???*

At this belated stage, the Highways Agency is putting its head over the parapet and will be holding presentations for our information: surely these should have been made ages ago. In these days of free speech, democracy and civil liberties, far be it that we should or could object or have any say on what is done to us, but some information would help swallow the bitter pill! Locally and belatedly, these presentations will take place:

Friday 24 February, 2 - 9pm at the Holiday Inn, London Road, Markyate. (*Information came much too late to include this in the last issue.*)

Friday 10 March, 2 - 9pm at Peter Edwards Hall, Slip End.

(Notice of this could hardly be shorter and unless you have Internet or spot the ads tucked away towards the back of a local paper or two, you would have been unaware of these dates and venues.)

It is understood here at Parish News that Church Road will be closed from the beginning of March for 6 months with added threats that further closures may be made later.

Diversions will be sign-posted around the lanes and rat runs. We hope that our fears of congestion and worse do not become reality. and that in the long term, the dust will settle and the monster becomes its benign self again.

We hope that it will be worth it, although past experience of M25 widening suggests that traffic very soon increases to fill up the space. *God knows where is all this getting us*

General Work

The good gardener will certainly have completed all his digging and trenching by this time, but some may still have some work to do, the quicker it is finished the better. Ground that was turned over earlier in the winter and left rough should be broken down to a fine tilth.

Choose a day when the surface is fairly dry. You will do more harm than good if you walk about on beds that are soaking wet. Still, the right day often turns up several times during this month and may be looked for after a period of steady east winds. The lawn site should also be prepared now for turfing or sowing.

Vegetable Garden

A most important sowing for this first week in March, if the weather is reasonably kind, is that of main crop onions. Sow in drills 1 inch deep 9 inches to 1 foot apart. Culinary peas can also be sown now outdoors, 9 inches apart and no more than 3 inches deep.

Cauliflowers raised in frames can now be planted out, lift the plants with as much soil as possible, and plant with a trowel on really good well dug soil, Allow 2.5 feet between the rows and at least 18 inches between plants in rows. Get in early potatoes and broad beans,

Flowers & Fruit

Plant rose trees, make ground very firm, trim up herbaceous border, pinching out weak new growth from perennials. Gladioli bulbs can now be planted, and also sweet peas,

Strawberry runners should be laid for sprouting ends to root. cut off runners that show no new leaf, Raspberries that fruit in late summer should now be cut down to 6 inches. leaving a couple of buds, fresh shoots will grow in good time. canes planted in autumn will not fruit till following year.

**And don't forget the Open Gardens Day,
later this year in July!**




