

Two major matters concern us at the moment. The M1 project rankles on, still in its early days and, if that is not enough, some long term schemings are dripping out relating to potentially huge developments in what is left of our countryside once, if ever, the Highways Agency goes away.

Pepperstock

Hopes were that the Pepperstock HA/M1 “borrow-pit” workings will conclude soon, but these hopes are now dashed. It is understood that the one year period of the Pepperstock workings approved by local planning authorities has, unbelievably, ***not yet started!***

The Highways Agency tyrants seem able to make up the rules as they go along and it appears that the concrete re-cycling plant, mountains of waste material and debris, all the heavy lorry movements and wanton destruction of our countryside are unsanctioned by the planning authorities. It has become apparent that not a single shovel-full of borrow-pit material has yet been taken out so, according to the HA, the 12 month clock is not yet ticking. This is beautiful logic if you are on the HA side, but a huge problem for local residents. Applying logic biased towards local residents’ viewpoint, Parish News suggests that, if they have not started and the clock is not yet ticking, ***HA are going about their present mayhem unapproved?***

Information is needed from HA and Contractors “Community Relations” “Teams” about when the first extraction is to be made from this pit of despair. It would be cynical to hypothesise that this might not be until 2010 or so, when the second phase, north of J10, might be underway after the anticipated protracted completion of the first phase. And PN would not suspect conspiratorial dealings between the HA and building developer suits, resulting that this area might *never* be returned to agricultural use, with seamless regression leading to building development.

Do not let this issue take our eyes off another “ball”, namely Church Road. Closed for most of the year now, literally the only sign of re-opening is the figure 8 (months, used to be 6) on the road sign at the point of closure. HA track record is that we will not be informed until say December, that Church Road might be re-opened sometime in 2007-ish, perhaps.

Building Developments


Putting the HA/M1 aside if that is possible, what are all these “development schemings” all about? Government is presently decreeing that many thousands of new homes are needed in the South Midlands, including thousands on our patch. The map opposite shows huge parcels of land have been outlined as possibilities, including many acres in the Slip End area, spreading out to Caddington, Hyde and Kinsbourne Green. What about that then? (NB: Sadly the map is already out of date, but if you imagine the width of the M1 as about double that shown, you will not be too far out.)

At the moment these suggestions are being run up the flagpole and are not yet even “plans”. However, this new does cast many shadows on how thoughts and minds of our governors, might go in the next decade or two. Until specific planning is drafted it is not yet possible to comment in detail but some thoughts may be expressed, you bet.

Green Belt

For the shaded regions on the map to become areas of building development, there would need to be re-designation of Green Belt land, land which is set aside to protect and maintain countryside and prevent separate communal areas becoming a greater sprawl.

Clearly, if massive developments on the scale suggested here were to go forward, Slip End would become physically joined with Aley Green, Caddington and other areas. So watch out for the Green Belt degradation process swinging into action and oppose if you see fit.



Local discussion has already started and Parish News encourages healthy debate, but we urge some caution. Please keep to the facts as far as they are made known to us, mainly from local councils and central government. As part of this process, it is vital for you get along to council meetings to hear accurate reports and to be as clued up as possible.

Sadly, some mis-informed talk is already going around. Rumour that the Rugby Club is to be moved to the other side of the M1 to allow housing to go up on the present site, are misplaced, at the moment. That is not yet on the agenda. Also, talk of a connection from J10 to Front Street is rubbish! True, as part of the schemings there *might* be an M1 service area or some such, which *might* be accessed from the new J10 roundabout but without connection to Front Street .

What's the alternative?

Fact is that Parish News, along with our local councillors, *is* in favour of reasonable, well planned development, but not on the apocalyptic scale suggested here. For sure, our area could do with much improvement which should come as a result of good planning on a smaller scale which, as time goes on could in fact become quite extensive. Let's face it, our infrastructure is a botched mess at the moment: just to mention a couple of things, we have no doctor's surgery or chemist. And as good and constructive as his recent upgrades are, it would be good to see Anil and Co. set his stall in a modern, purpose built shop.

We at Parish News believe that somewhat smaller areas should be identified well before development and Green Belt re-designated on a progressive rather than wholesale basis. **But be aware that once a Green Belt area is re-designated, there is no going back! Such areas would inevitably be built upon.**

No doubt all this will run and run: so keep your eyes and ears open to what is going on around you!

pretty entries, Joan Bunyan won the competition for the best table centre.



Residents are encouraged to attend the monthly meetings of the Parish Council in the Village Hall, generally on the 1st Monday of each month at 8pm (Although take note that this month the regular date has been re-arranged, see Diary Page.)

There are quite a few serious issues at the moment and, if you wish to keep abreast of what is going on or what various authorities have in store for us you can do no better than to attend regularly.

The decision to allow local opinions to be voiced at the start of each meeting is welcomed and may encourage those who were put off attending because previously the “forum” was opened towards the end of meetings.

The Vegetable Garden in October

The white hearts of cauliflowers are liable to be damaged by frost, so look over the bed occasionally and bend some of the outer leaves over any hearts that are forming. This will give them all the protection they need.

Plant as many as possible of spring cabbages, if these were sown from seeds. Lift and store a good supply of turnips if they are of a reasonable size in a frost proof place for the winter; cut the tops off first.

Flower & Fruit Garden

Deciduous shrubs can be planted or shifted to other quarters. New roses can also be planted, as soon as you are able to clear beds of their temporary summer occupants. Lose no time in planting out spring flowers.

At this time it is wise to complete the gathering of all apples and pears: don't let them hang once the weather gets really wintry.

General Work

October is a good time to use such slow acting fertilizers such as basic slag. Gather all leaves and put into a compost bin, burn them or put in your "Green Bin". Turf and repair lawns.

A Green Allotment

Jo and Glen, a remarkable mother and daughter team, took over one of the vacant Slip End allotments this year and, if you look at it now, you can only wonder at how hard and effectively they have worked.

Gluttons for punishment, they have now taken on a second allotment which has been neglected for several years.

Unlike some of us, who look for almost anything which will reduce our labour input, these two are seriously 'organic'! Amongst other things, they grow 'love-in-a-mist' next to the carrots to repel carrot fly, spray the brassica seedlings with a garlic solution to keep off the cabbage-white caterpillars and

water on a particularly noxious solution of nettle extract as a fertiliser. The results are impressive! So, if you want to go 'green', there are experts to advise!

Harvest Days are here again!



It has been a fantastic season for tomatoes and Jo and Glen are seen busy picking their crop. To be honest there has been quite a glut, so the ladies are busy in the Kitchen preserving the surplus. Some of Glen's favourite dishes come from Italy where their cuisine has many and wonderful ways with tomatoes!

If you fancy some healthy exercise with the reward of harvesting your own fresh fruit and vegetables, there are some vacant allotments and we will be glad to have your company. This is a good time of year to start and prepare the ground, so have a word with Derek Worsley (56 Front Street) and he'll sort you out!
