Harvest

of Harvesting winter cabbages cauliflowers and Brussels sprouts should be starting. Leeks should be ready, take what you need and leave the rest to stand until required. Harvesting can be tricky in severe weather, so lift a few and heel them in on well dug ground which will not freeze solid. Dig carrots now, storing them in peat, sand or a traditional clamp. Lift celery, parsnips and Swedes although they may be left in the ground until needed. Cover them with fleece or straw. Check vegetables in store and remove anything that has started to rot. Potatoes especially need to be checked and watch out for slugs.

General Jobs in the Garden

On our clay soil, digging when the soil is wet and sticky can do more harm than good. Dig only when conditions are right. Winter is the time to do double digging, incorporating manure into the bottom of the trench and deepening your topsoil. As ground becomes vacant, dig it over and spread manure over the surface. Leave the soil roughly dug in large clumps and the worms and frost will break these up.

Stake young trees and tall brassicas to prevent wind rock damage. Cover compost to prevent rain leaching the nutrients and to keep heat of decomposition in.

To get the best out of your garden send soil samples for professional pH and nutrient analysis or use a kit or meter available from garden centres and DIY stores.

Cuttings

Soft fruits and vines can be propagated by cuttings inserted in open ground. Choose sturdy ripened shoots of this year's growth, cutting them just below a bud and trimming to just above a bud. For blackcurrants make them about 8-10 inches long, 12-15 inches for other fruits. Insert them into the soil to about half their length. Grow all except blackcurrants on

a short stem removing buds from the lower part of the cutting. All the buds should be left on blackcurrant cuttings.

Sowing, Planting & Cultivating

Onions sown just after Christmas will benefit from the longer growing period. Sow in seed boxes in the greenhouse or frost free cold frame. Cold frames can heat up in winter sun so particular attention must be given to ventilation. Pigeons will be on the look out for food, so net your brassicas to keep them away. Remove any yellow leaves.

Fruit

Plant bare rooted fruit trees and bushes and prune apple and pear trees. Cut down canes of autumn-fruiting raspberries which have finished fruiting and burn to prevent fungal diseases. Now is a good time to plant rhubarb crowns which will benefit from being left out to be frosted before planting.

Young trees should be supported with stakes and ties. Stakes can tend to work loose, which means they won't be doing their job of preventing wind rock loosening the roots.

Seed Order

Go through the seed catalogues, decide what you want to grow and make a list. Most gardeners love a bargain but sometimes a bargain isn't as good as it appears to be. Considering the time and effort spent in growing anything from an Aubergine to a Tomato, buying the right seed is not a luxury. Quality suppliers like Thompson & Morgan, Suttons and Dobies offer selections of vegetable seeds, fruit bushes, fruit and nut trees.

Dobies have supplied seeds direct to gardeners in the Chester area since 1880 and for over fifty years to customers throughout the UK. Obviously, Mr Titchmarsh would not lend his name to anything inferior and Suttons have been supplying seeds since 1806 so they have a bit of a track record too!


around the village and the congregation, so we Centre for refreshments and to play. set to work to do as many boxes as we could.

Yet another 'scheme' threatens!

I have received the proposals of another 'developer' who is looking to build on the land behind Summer Street running its full length from Church Road to Pepperstock. This one is referred to as *Luton* Gateway. It will also use land on the other side of the motorway. If these and the Bushwood proposals come to fruition, the land adjacent to the motorway stretching from Pepperstock to Chaul End will be built on, and Upper Woodside merged in with it all.

Some Councillors from here and Caddington recently attended a presentation from the Luton West schemers. No new information emerged. I understand that at a recent meeting Luton Borough Council decided to withdraw their support from the Luton East Development so the focus may be drawn in our direction.

A small group of residents from the two parishes of Slip End and Caddington recently met to form the committee of an action group which is being set up to oppose all large scale development on our greenbelt. I understand every house will soon receive a leaflet introducing the group and there will be a small action for you take. As time goes by, residents with specialist skills will be co opted to the committee so that their expertise can be used and I gather there will also be plenty of opportunities for all residents who want to, to take part in a number of activities to show their feelings to the powers that be.

In the public meetings, the views of residents were overwhelmingly against large scale development, the battle to save the green belt is not going to be easy and the action group will need your support. The Action Group will need funding and I understand Father Christmas will be visiting the Parish in a float collecting donations to help with this.

Hard fact

On another subject, Steve Fuell and I attended a conference for Town and Parish Councils at Central Beds Offices. One staggering statistic I came away with, which I thought you might find interesting as well. Apparently, the cost of supporting the credit crunch globally amounts to \$13,000,000,000,000 (\$13 trillion) or put another way, it equates to about \$2000 for every man woman and child on the planet.

Something positive

Speaking of Steve, his hard work has once again paid off. By the time you read this, resurfacing work in the centre of Slip End will be complete or nearing completion. The work in Church Road was not due to take place for quite some time but has been brought forward by Highways. Hopefully, Steve's work in getting the new road surface earlier, new Airparks buses and Airparks voluntary 20 mph speed limit will give Church Road residents quieter nights.

It is with great regret I have to tell you that Nikki, our Parish Clerk, will be resigning soon.

Sadly, she has been unwell and can no longer continue with her busy life at home and work for the Parish. Nikki will be carrying on for a little while yet as we look for a new Clerk and ease that person into post.

We are very grateful for the generosity of several groups which have donated grant aid to us this year. These are vital to the continuing success of our Youth Club!
