### Focus on Slip End Lower School - Special Edition

It's hard to believe a year has gone by since our last special feature on the Village School. Since then there have been plenty of new developments and of course, the exciting "Outstanding" Ofsted result. The school continues to go from strength to strength with new after school clubs, a link up with an American school and an opportunity for some children to get involved in politics.

I spent some time with Assistant Head Teacher, Emma Peppiatt, who brought me up to date with what's been happening.

There have been some physical changes in the school, with the year 3 and 4 classrooms having new partitioning installed instead of the internal walls. It means the classrooms and quiet rooms can be opened up to provide a large flexible learning space. This gives the teachers and children the chance to experiment with different activities and ways of learning in a bigger area. The extra space has been very useful when running some exciting extra activities that you can read about in the following pages.

### Next Stop.. The World!

This is the second time the children have gone globe-trotting within their very own school. On International Day every child received their own "passport", which was stamped when they arrived at a new destination. Each class had its room made over to represent a different country and throughout the day the children moved from class to class, experiencing and learning about aspects of life in that destination. Of course, the school couldn't do it without the parent helpers, some of whom are actually from the countries in question.

The children were in mixed age groups so that the older ones could help the younger ones in the fun activities. First stop in Reception Class was sunny Spain. There was the opportunity to taste Spanish

omelettes and try their hand at Flamenco dancing taught by a talented Spanish mum, who showed the children how it was done. After Spain, they moved right across the globe (and School) to year 1's classroom where it was Carnival Time. Brazil came to Slip End with colourful carnival masks, music and pictures of the exciting costumes that go to make up the World's most famous carnival. The children made their own masks and learned about the celebrations.

Moving north into Year 2 and the USA came next. Slip End has already forged links with Holly Springs Elementary school in North Carolina through Year 4 teacher, Miss Carroll. The children in year 4 have linked up with a class of the same age and shared information and pictures with them. Now all the children had the chance to learn more about the school life of children in the USA.

Moving back to Europe in Year 3's class the children arrived in Switzerland, home of Swiss cheese and most importantly, Swiss chocolate! There was food tasting of both and a geography lesson to learn about the mountains.

To round off their travels, everyone got to visit the special "Foreign Exchange" in Year 4's room.

Not only did they get to pinpoint the countries on a world map and pick out their flags but they also learned about different currencies and improved their maths by working out exchange rates. The whole day finished with an International Assembly where the children shared their experiences and got to see one of the teachers perform a Flamenco dance! Ole!!

Slip End Lower already has achieved level 1 of the International School Award and activities like this event and twinning with Holly Springs in North Carolina is all part of working their way towards level 2.

### Let's Go Clubbing!

One of the things that make SELS such a special place is the dedication of teachers and volunteers alike. The two after school clubs which were set up recently are proving to be a great success; there's a waiting list to join!

Miss Carroll and Mrs Casson are now running a Science Club which, has gone off with a bang, pardon the pun! On Monday afternoons, from 3.30-4.30, the children are split into year 1 & 2 groups and year 3 & 4 groups. They take part in fun experiments

such as growing crystals, making volcanoes and bubbles. So many children wanted to join that they have split them up into two groups so one group could take part this half term and the rest next half term.

Thursday is Project Club day run by Paula Fowler who kindly volunteers her time and efforts to teach the children arts and crafts including cards, cakes and other items that can be sold after school or at local events to raise funds for SELS. This is an excellent way in which to help both the children and the school. Each club offers new learning opportunities as well as lots of fun.

### **Democracy in Action**

SELS also gives the children a say in how their school is run. To enable this to happen the school has a pupil Council formed by two representatives from each year, who are through class elections. Council meets regularly to discuss any issues that concern the children and is chaired by Mrs Casson, the year 3 teacher. This year, the two year 4 Council members have also become part of 'United Voice'. This is a group made up of representatives from 16 School Councils across the area. who meet each half term to discuss issues in which they are interested in. Topics include the environment, fair trade, bullying and global sustainability. The schools take turns in hosting the meetings and it is a brilliant opportunity for the children to work with different people to discuss wider issues.

Recently the United Voice members visited Parliament in London for a special guided tour and to gain a better understanding of how Government works. It was an interesting and informative day which the children enjoyed very much. This has all been instigated by Mrs Casson who has worked hard this year to give SELS children this unique chance to be involved in an important initiative.

As this was all in the run up to the general election, it was extremely relevant and inspired the older children to create their own four political parties and hold an election of their own on May 6th. They selected their manifestos, debated the issues and then voted in a secret ballot in their own polling booth. A fantastic way to get children enthused about the democratic process.

### **Out and About**

There are always events going on at SELS that enrich the learning experience. Often visitors come in, such as theatre or special music groups, but it's also good for the children to get out on a visit. Recently years 3 and 4 enjoyed a trip to St Albans to learn about the ancient Romans. With such a good museum relatively close by, it is an excellent place to get hands on experience with exhibits and objects from the past to gain an insight into how the Romans lived.

June also sees the annual year 4 residential trip. Miss Carroll introduced last year's class to the joys of Hautbois House in Norfolk and this year's class are following in their footsteps. This action packed trip has activities such as climbing, zip wires, archery and a trip to the beach. It all promotes physical education and helps the children with their own independence as they cope away from home. For many, it is their first trip without Mum or Dad so it is a big step and one they all enjoy.

#### A New View

Year 2 teacher Ange Poulton joined SELS last September. As a new addition we wanted to get her viewpoint on the School.

"This time last year I was thrilled to find out I was coming to Slip End Lower School. I spent a nervous summer wondering what it would be like, if I'd fit in and like it. I needn't have worried" she said

"Since arriving I've been made most welcome and quickly felt part of the team. In fact now I don't even feel like a new comer. I've found the school ethos mirrors my own educational values and was proud and honoured to be part of the team that earned SELS an Outstanding Ofsted report.

I am lucky to work where every member of the school community is valued, from the youngest child to the oldest adult. We have beautiful surroundings and I've enjoyed the sunsets and views from my classroom window. I look forward to continuing to work with such wonderful pupils and colleagues".

### ALLOTMENT ASSOCIATION—JUNE

Salad crops should be available, lettuce, spring onion, radish etc, Summer cabbage and early carrots, with the later thinnings providing a great addition to a salad or steamed with a cooked meal. The early potatoes will be coming in this month and as your potatoes will be going from ground to pan in a matter of minutes, you will discover a truly wonderful flavour. Beetroot, young turnips and Summer spinach may all be welcome fresh additions to your diet and early peas could well be cropping in June, especially in the South.

### Sowing, Planting and Cultivating

We really need to keep on top of the weeds. Hoeing them off as small seedlings will make the job far easier than waiting for them to grow and send their roots down. Hoeing is best done on a dry day so that the weeds do not have a chance to recover. Don't forget to sharpen your hoe before you start and frequently as you use it. Keeping a small sharpening stone or file in your pocket will make this more convenient. Continue thinning out carrots, parsnips, beetroot etc. and water when required. Your best measuring instrument for water is your finger. If the top of the soil looks dry, insert your finger into the soil and if it's dry at the tip, then you need to water. Don't just sprinkle a few drops on the surface, it probably won't penetrate and do any good. Far better to give a good soaking less frequently that will get to the roots of your crops. In very dry weather, keeping the surface friable by hoeing will help keep the from getting to the surface. water

### **Planting**

You should be able to plant out brassicas now; Broccoli and calabrese, Brussels sprouts and Summer cabbage. If you have started beans in pots, both runner and French they can go outside too. Leeks may well be ready to move to their final position. Ideally they want to be about pencil thickness. Don't follow the old guidance to trim the leaves

and roots when transplanting leeks. It has proved to be of no benefit and is counterproductive. Celery can also go out now. Outdoor tomatoes can go to their final position now. When moving plants from greenhouse to outdoors it is a good idea to condition them to the move. Take them out in the day and put them back at night for a few days or from greenhouse to cold frame. This avoids shocking the plant by a sudden and drastic change in climate

#### Sowing

There is a lot to sow this month and with many crops you can sow one set and then a few weeks later re-sow to give you a succession of fresh vegetables at the peak of perfection. In dry weather it is a good idea to soak your seed drill before sowing and then just water with a fine rose after.

### In the greenhouse

Keep pinching off the side shoots of your tomatoes and keep an eye out for pests such as aphids, whitefly, red spider mite. If you are subject to attack by these pests it is worth checking out biological controls as these are perfectly safe to use and, used correctly, more effective than chemical controls.

#### Fruit

Make sure your fruiting plants have sufficient water when the fruit is swelling. This is critical to a good crop. Thin out plums and apples in June. Better to have one reasonable apple than three miniature marbles. Nature naturally tends towards this and sheds excess fruit. This is known as the 'June Drop'. It's best to thin out after this.

### **General Tasks**

The infantry of slugs and snails are attacking at ground level so take action to keep them down and the air force of birds are coming from the skies to eat your crops. Don't forget the netting. The butterflies are about now as well, so check the undersides of your brassica leaves for the yellow or white eggs that will hatch into caterpillars and devastate the plant. You can squash them, wipe or wash them off easily at this stage.


