ALEY GREEN METHODIST CHURCH FLOWER FESTIVAL

This year's flower festival had a theme of "A Year in the Life of Aley Green Methodist Church". All of the twenty-four arrangements represented an area of the life of the church and community.

The displays in the porch, welcoming people in, had the themes of the Crucifixion and the Caddington Village Show.



Inside there were arrangements on the windowsills and at the front and side of the church. They varied in style according to the subject and ranged from large and complicated arrangements to themed displays incorporating flowers.

The themes included such varied subjects as the Last Supper and the Resurrection, Bible study and Lent groups, Weddings & Christenings, Ecumenical services, music, finances, allotments, preserves, the walking



group, catering, coffee and lunch groups and very important – cleaning! All were very effective and beautiful. It would be hard to choose one favourite but I particularly liked the one for Finances with lilies representing rolled paper and pens among the flowers as well as the cleaning display with flowers in a mop bucket.



There were plenty of visitors from around the circuit and the villages who came to look at the arrangements to a musical accompaniment during most of the time. There were gifts, cards, plants and small arrangements for sale as well as the usual home made cakes and preserves. Coffee, tea and cakes were served, as well as light lunches on the Saturday which were delicious and certainly went down a treat! I noticed that the steak and kidney puddings seemed to be very popular as did the desserts with cream! The weekend finished with an afternoon service of Communion for Mothering Sunday, after which some of the displays were sold.

Thanks must go to everyone who worked so hard giving up their time for the advance organisation, baking and collecting flowers as well as those who arranged flowers. Thank you also to all the visitors who came to admire the displays and helped raise money for the church funds.

GREETINGS FROM CATHY PULLINGER

This month I thought I'd tell you a little about myself and how I got started on the journey to being vicar of St. Andrew's.

It is a bit surprising really because my upbringing was decidedly atheistic. My parents were convinced that there was no spiritual reality at all and I wasn't even allowed to go to Brownies because there was a promise made each week that included God in it. However the explanations for life that my parents gave did not seem to me to be enough. I felt there was more to life than mere chance and that as humans we needed more help with our lives if we were to get along OK, even getting on together within our family seemed hard enough, never mind looking after the planet!

So, from an early age I was searching for something more, for significance I suppose, for love certainly. I read about all sorts of religions, and tried out some churches but didn't find anything that drew me until I went to college and made friends with a student who was herself coming into a new and deeper relationship with God. She chatted about what she was experiencing at the church she went to and it intrigued me, she was so obviously changing and excited about what she was encountering.

Eventually I went along and was amazed at the warmth of people's welcome and the reality of their worship. I began to read the Bible. I read about Jesus, particularly in the gospels of Luke and John. What I read I thought was wonderful, his love, his acceptance of all, his self giving for the needs of others, his promise to come and live in us and be with us through the Holy Spirit. If only it were true I thought, I would give my life to this.

But, was it true? This question was a great struggle for me. I didn't want to believe in something that had no basis to it, that was just wishful thinking. It took a long time, but God did convince me, he convinced me by

the reality of his presence, The Holy Spirit that I had read about in the Bible was alive and well, and clearly at work amongst his people.

When I spoke out to my friend that I thought I did believe then that same Holy Spirit came to me – came within me and began to transform my life. Again it has been a slow process, a continuing process but undeniably real. The person that I was, very shy and withdrawn would never have been able to relate to people as I do now in my ministry. I am so glad that God has led me to himself and into the fullness of life that he wants for each of us.

During May, at St. Andrew's we will be focusing on the presence of the Risen Lord amongst us, his desire for us to share in his abundant life. You would be so welcome if you would like to come along, whether you used to come to church, or have never been, as I hadn't, whether you are sure of your faith or just wanting to explore, there will be a welcome for you. *Bless you, Cathy*

Our local councillors

We have been fortunate over the years that people from within the community have put themselves forward to serve us on the Parish Council. They work on issues within in our neighbourhood and the results of their efforts are evolving. That is not to say that they have been successful with all aims and objectives as the processes can be tedious and often appear fruitless. However, our councillors strive to achieve, notwithstanding the present economic situation where money is in short supply and cuts are the order of the day.

Now, all councillors are locals who know how things tick here; they are known to many and they are all approachable. Council business is goes on constructively, without histrionics or hot air. Regular Parish News reports from the Council reflect news with open realism, no spin.

New moves

Over the years it has been good to see new people putting themselves forward to sit on the council. Neighbourly processes have been furthered by the formation of community groups which are separate from, but liaise with, the Parish Council. Again 'the system' may appear tedious and results may appear to be slow in coming through, but steady progress is in hand.

Why have an election?

With regard to the election early in May, Parish Council nominations are in and the list has been closed by the Returning Officer. If the number of nominations exceeds the number of seats on the council, an election is held. Such is the case this time round. There is one more nomination than seats and so the election will take place on May 5th at the Polling Station at the Village Hall.

No names, they will probably take a chance to chat on your doorstep before the election, you may know some of them already. Many existing Parish Councillors have stood again, bringing experience and deep local knowledge. That is not to rule out possibilities of injections of new blood, always welcome to maintain vitality. Two new candidates are standing. One is a resident of Upper Woodside who has been part of the Community Group involved with the upcoming Village Plan. The other lives in neighbouring Luton and, with endorsement by the British National Party, adds a political dimension to the candidates.

Philip Pemnan

One member not standing this time round is Philip Penman, who stands down after many years of service at Parish and District levels. Philip has worked hard and diligently on our behalf. In particular, he held great responsibility, working hard at District level during transition from South Beds to Central Beds. ***We owe Philip a great debt of gratitude and wish him and his family the best for the future.***

Go Vote! Local elections are notoriously under-supported by the electorate! This is a shame, not least for the reason that life in a democracy is not enjoyed by the global majority. Consider seriously who you feel might best represent our local interests, then go to the Village Hall to register your vote on Thursday 5th May.

May usually has a lot of dry sunny days, which make up for the checks of a cold spring, midday temperatures average 13C (55F). Later in the month as the risk of frost diminishes apply mulches to conserve moisture. Continue regular mowing of lawns and you can apply a high nitrogen fertilizer if you require a lush lawn. Weed killer can also be applied if they are a problem.

Hoe between hardy border plants to control weeds. If any leaves on roses start to roll up remove them, as they probably contain the sawfly grub or the tortrix caterpillar that will damage the plants. Dahlias can be planted out when damage of frost is past, chrysanthemums can also be planted out but some form of slug control is advisable. Regularly hoe between gladioli and water if weather is dry. Tie in Sweet Peas regularly as they grow and remove tendrils. Remove dead flowers from daffodils and hyacinths. Daffodils and tulips can be dug up to make way for summer bedding plants and dried off to be planted in the autumn. In the Alpine bed, trim aubrietias and other plants to stop seeding and prolong flowering.

Tender young shrubs such as fuchsia, hydrangea, choisya and arbutus can be planted out, but keep well watered. Feed all fruit trees and bushes and tie new growth on blackberries and loganberries and control weeds around the base.

Protect strawberries with straw and control slugs. Keep an eye out for frosts and cover or earth up potatoes; prepare sites for growing marrows, courgettes and pumpkins for sowing later in the month. Sow French beans and runner beans during the second half of the month.

Main crop carrots can go in, and sow for a succession of salad crops such as lettuce,

radish and beetroot and harvest when large enough, not when old and woody. Brussels sprouts can be planted into their final position along with autumn cabbage and cauliflower. Towards the end of the month sow sweet corn straight into the soil, arrange in an oblong to aid pollination, approximately 15 inches in each direction. Take cuttings of herbs such as rosemary, sage and thyme. Take root cuttings of mint and grow them in bottomless container to stop it spreading.

Put up hanging baskets later in the month but beware of frosts and keep them well watered. Roses, lilacs, fruit trees and many other plants produce suckers, sometimes well away from the parent plant, these should be removed to keep the parent plant strong. Pests become really active this month so watch out for slugs, snails and check fruit bushes and broad beans for aphid infestation and take appropriate action.



Plenty to do this month, but proceed with caution and if you are worried about frosts leave it for another week or so, as it can be a big disappointment to plant out a border only to get up one morning and find the tender plants have been destroyed by a late frost and you have to start all over again, it can also be very costly. Happy gardening and hope to hear from you via the e-mail and help to resolve some of your queries.

**REPLACING THE WATER MAINS –SLIP
END, NEAR CADDINGTON**

I am writing to advise you that Veolia Water is upgrading 3.2km of the underground network of pipes that supply water each day to residents, businesses and schools in the area. This work represents an investment of £0.6m.

Some of the existing water mains in this area were laid more than 65 years ago and have given many years of good service, but have now reached the end of their useful lives. The majority of these pipes are cast iron, which have begun to weaken and this has made them vulnerable to leaks and bursts. By replacing targeted sections of the water mains network, Veolia Water will be able to continue supplying water to the local community for many years to come.

As part of this programme we will be working in your area on 4 April on a scheme to lay a new stretch of water main to secure the supply to the area.

This work is expected to take up to 5 months to complete and will include replacement of the water mains in the following streets:

All customers affected by the work will receive a letter and customer leaflet before works start in their street to advise them of the project.

We are working closely with the Central Bedfordshire Highways Department to ensure that this scheme runs as smoothly as possible and residents, businesses and schools are kept informed. Vulnerable and elderly customers are being encouraged to notify Veolia Water of their special needs by registering on our Safeguard scheme. It was an early start on the 16th April for the Unlock Walk. With part of the M1 closed because of a fire near Junction 1 it meant a bit of a detour but we arrived at the first church in good time and received a warm welcome at The New Testament Church of God. The congregation had done wonderful work here over the last five years when the church had been used for storage and had been made redundant!



Churches in London face a constant battle just to keep open whilst all around buildings are being knocked down for redevelopment. One of the things we noticed is the amount of work the Church does to reach the wider community, young and old with the buildings being used for many different purposes. The six and a half mile walk took us along the famous Old Kent Road and many interesting sites. Southwark Cathedral was a hive of activity with many visitors and we enjoyed a quick walk around the impressive building which only became a cathedral in 1905. There are many



monuments situated there including one to William Shakespeare and a Memorial to the Marchioness when 51 people lost their lives.

We saw the amazing Shard Building which, when finished in 2012 will be over 1.000 feet tall. 


