Margaret and Norman were married at Trinity Congregational Church in St Albans on 31st May 1952 and had five bridesmaids. They travelled to Cliftonville for their honeymoon and what a handsome couple they made.

They had first met at the Drill Hall, St Albans on 31st May in 1947 and married five years later settling down in Redbourn where they lived for thirty years enjoying married life and bringing up their three sons. After serving in the army Norman turned to the building trade eventually running his own company.

They decided to move to Herstmonceux near Eastbourne in Sussex, famous for its Castle and its medieval festival and a place they had previously visited and liked. They enjoyed many happy years there continuing to run dances for charity as they had at Redbourn and raised money for the Lifeboat organisation, often in fancy dress or World War II outfits. They settled in Pepperstock and Norman took up gardening and rented an allotment where he spends many hours when fully fit, at the moment sharing his plot with a friend whilst he waits for a knee operation.

They celebrated their silver wedding with seven other local couples as guests of the Herts Advertiser who organised a special jubilee luncheon at the Noke Hotel for them all. Then in the evening they were invited to a party aboard the royal yacht Britannia as guests of their brother in law, Lieutenant Brian Searle. They were shown all over the yacht and had a wonderful memorable evening.

On their golden wedding they held a big celebration party at the village hall with family and friends, see below with their sons Graham, Martin and Neil.



They have six grandchildren, five girls and one boy below (plus two more girls who have adopted them as grandparents). They will be



travelling to Barnstaple in Devon for their diamond celebrations, going out for trips and then more celebrating in Pepperstock for the Jubilee and a big family meal later at a local restaurant. Congratulations Margaret and Norman and enjoy your 60th anniversary.

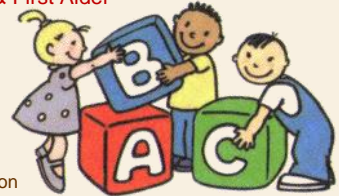

ST ANDREW'S CHURCH

On Tuesday we are all given an extra day's holiday in honour of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's Diamond Jubilee. At St. Andrew's we decided that we wanted to celebrate together with those who would like to join us and give thanks for her long reign. I want to quote a little from our local Bishop's tribute to her.

"In 1947 on her 21st birthday she suggested that we were all called to bring good to the world and then said that to do this: "We must give nothing less than the whole of ourselves... I should like to make a solemn declaration now. It is very simple. I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service."

In 1952 in her first Christmas broadcast, she said; "I want to ask you all, whatever religion you may be, to pray for me, to pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve him and you."

I think that everyone would agree that she has kept these promises admirably, as our Head of State she has been a constant presence in a changing world and an inspiration to us all to be faithful in our relationships and diligent in our responsibilities. She is also the Head of the Church of England, and as priest I am grateful that she is clearly and openly a woman with a strong personal Christian faith. I believe her faithful service flows from her faith in Jesus who said, "He who would be first among you must be your servant."

We will be thanking God for her in a traditional service of Morning Prayer on Sunday 3rd June at 10.30am to which you are all warmly welcomed. We will use the liturgy that Her Majesty herself has authorised, the uniformed organisations will take part as well as the children who normally come to church. Afterwards, from 12 noon onwards, we will be having a "street party" type lunch in the Peter Edwards Hall, and anyone from the Parish is very welcome to come to this, there will be

music and food, games and a quiz reflecting and focusing on the 1950's and a power point presentation of the Queen's life.

There will be no charge for this, but if you would like to make a donation it will be given to the Community Projects Group to contribute to the setting up of the "Good Neighbour Scheme." Please do come and enjoy a trip down memory lane and celebrate with us, with your best hat on to get you in the mood!

We are also joining in with the diocesan "**Open Church Sunday**" initiative on Sunday 24th June. Church will be open from 9.30am before Holy Communion at 10.30am. 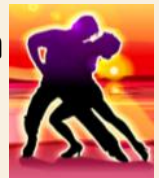

Parish Plan Good Neighbour Scheme

At our May Meeting, Jane Payton and Sue Diamond from 'Caddington Care' spoke to us about their experience setting up a Good Neighbour Scheme in their village.

Running since 2009, they now have a committee of 10 and 50 volunteers. Extending help and assistance in a wide variety of ways, to about 100 residents, their scheme has become very popular. Run in conjunction with the doctor's surgery at Caddington, Jane mentioned that there has been interest from Slip End Parish residents to use the scheme, but they have to have a boundary to limit the area covered. Hence our wish to set up a scheme to serve our Parish as soon as possible.

Jane and Sue passed on valuable information about insurance covering several aspects such as public liability and car insurance, CRB requirements, etc. All Slip End Parish residents are *de-facto* members of our CPG and a good number turned out to hear about the Caddington experience. This went down well and about a dozen volunteers signed up on the night as volunteers.

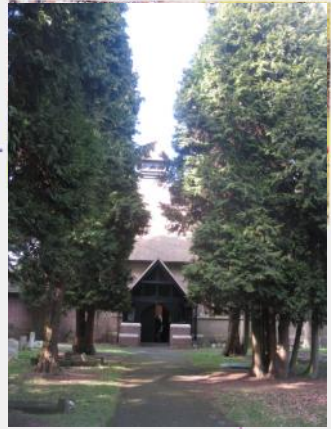

Gardeners Special

The weather this month is usually hot and with little rain, so to prevent the lawn from drying out too much lift the mower blades and leave the box off when mowing as the clippings will help to retain moisture. When the ground is soft after a shower spike the lawn so that moisture can penetrate down to the roots and keep the lawn looking green.

Hoe around rose bushes and remove any suckers from the root stock and mulch to preserve moisture. If you require long stem roses for cutting, remove the side buds by pinching them out when small and leave the top bud, this will produce a bigger and better quality bloom.

Any early herbaceous plants that are starting to fade, cut back to approximately three inches, this will encourage a fresh crop of foliage and possibly a second flowering. Dahlias and chrysanthemums can either be stopped (pinching out the top bud) to produce bushy flowers or disbudded (pinching out the side buds) if large showy blooms are required. This should be done by the middle of the month for best results, again a good mulch around the roots will prevent plants drying out.

Border carnations and pinks will require support to stop them looking unruly. Early in the month cut the grassy leaves off irises near to the soil level as the rhizomes need to be baked by the sun to produce good flowers. Primroses and primulas can be dug up and divided after a shower and replanted straight away this month to produce a good display next year. If left in large clumps the flowers will be small and of poor quality.

Wallflowers and Sweet Williams can be sown in their flowering positions at the end of the month for flowering in the spring. If fruit trees such as apple and pear are loaded with fruit, thinning out will improve the size of the fruit, but do this in stages as some trees will limit

the crops they carry naturally by dropping some of the fruit. Strawberries will produce runners this month so if you wish to increase your stock or replace old unproductive plants stake the runner in the ground until it roots. This can be done simply by placing a stone over the runner, removing unwanted runners.

Plant out Brussels sprouts, winter cabbages, purple and white sprouting broccoli in their final positions this month. Marrows and tomatoes are safe to be planted outside now. Towards the end of the month leeks can be planted six inches apart in rows twelve inches apart with a dibber and dropping the plant in, water in with a can to wash the soil around the roots. Do not fill the hole with soil and do not firm in as this will impede growth.

Carry on planting seeds for a succession of crops such as lettuce, radish, carrots and beet-root and pick when young for best flavour. Continue digging new potatoes, as the ground becomes vacant this can be used for leeks.

Plenty to do and enjoy this month in the garden and the allotment. If you can, visit the Open Gardens on the 30th for a pleasant day out and pick up some useful ideas and tips.

Your Neighbourhood Development Plan

From Cllr Keith Holme

You will have received a letter setting out the background to the Neighbourhood Plan which is being prepared by the Parish Councils of Slip End and Caddington and this article tries to clarify the backdrop which some Parishioners have suggested would be appropriate, bearing in mind the excellent work carried out recently to produce a Parish Plan for Slip End.

The Localism Act, which received Royal Assent on November 15 2011, introduced new rights and powers to allow local communities to shape new development by coming together to prepare neighbourhood plans. Parish Councils can use the new neighbourhood planning powers to establish policies for the development and use of land and the environment in their neighbourhood.

These are described legally as 'neighbourhood development plans.'

In an important change to the planning system *communities* can use neighbourhood planning to permit the *development they want* to see - in full or in outline – without the need for planning applications, but Local Councils will continue to produce development plans and neighbourhood development plans will have to be set within the strategic context of these plans.

Other conditions are:

1. they must have regard to national planning policy
2. they must be in general conformity with strategic policies in the development plan for the local area (such as the Central Bedfordshire core strategy)
3. they must be compatible with EU obligations and human rights requirements.

At a very early stage the two Parishes of Caddington and Slip End realised the possible advantages of creating such a plan to help control the housing and other environmental issues which might occur over the next decade. They are front-runners in the plans to enable residents to formulate their own plans for the place in which they live and have received Government funding to assist with certain aspects of the plan preparation.

How does this Plan differ from any we might have had in the past?

If approved in a local referendum, it will determine the future policy for planning approvals and other significant aspects of local life including transport, leisure facilities and health provision and the environment.

Perhaps the most significant difference will be the Legal Authority which the Plan will carry.

An independent qualified person will check that a neighbourhood development plan appropriately meets the conditions before it can be voted on in a local referendum. This is to make sure that referenda only take place when proposals are workable and of a decent quality.

Proposed neighbourhood development plans or orders need to gain the approval of a majority of voters of the neighbourhood to come into force.

If proposals pass the referendum, the local planning authority is under a legal duty to bring them into force.

The two Parish Councils are responsible for the preparation and final presentation of The Plan and any associated costs, apart from the referendum costs and some professional help. They have established a Steering Group to plan the process and to arrange for full and comprehensive consultations with as many different individuals and groups as possible in order to ensure that your ideas are made known.

The Steering Group can establish sub committees to gain help from interested people

Several members of the public have already been recruited to help.**

What are the rules governing the Group?

Ensure its actions are inclusive, open and transparent
Act in the best interests of both communities at all times
Members of the Steering Group must declare any personal interest

Over the next weeks and months you will be asked to give your views at a number of public meetings designed to create the relaxed environment which we hope will appeal to all members of the community. These will be meetings arranged for the public to air their views and at specialised meetings with local clubs and societies to gain their opinions also.

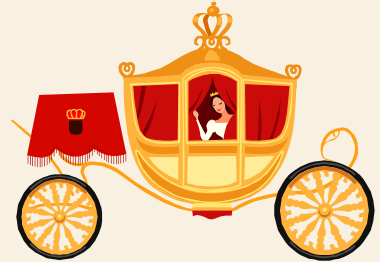

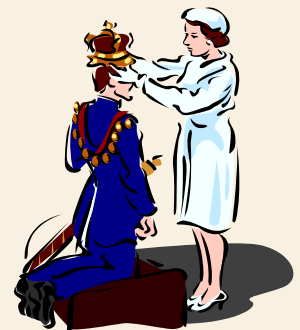

60 facts you may not know about The Queen in her Jubilee year

1. The Queen is the second longest serving monarch. Only five other kings and queens in British history have reigned for 50 years or more. They are: Victoria (63 years), George III (59 years), Henry III (56 years), Edward III (50 years) James VI of Scotland (James I of Eng) (58)
2. The Queen is the 40th monarch since William the Conqueror obtained the crown of England.
3. Since 1952 The Queen has given Royal Assent to more than 3,500 Acts of Parliament.
4. Over the reign, Her Majesty has given regular audiences to 12 Prime Ministers. They are:
 - Winston Churchill 1951-55
 - Sir Anthony Eden 1955-57
 - Harold Macmillan 1957-63
 - Sir Alec Douglas-Home 1963-64
 - Harold Wilson 1964-70 and 1974-76
 - Edward Heath 1970-74
 - James Callaghan 1976-79
 - Margaret Thatcher 1979-90
 - John Major 1990-97
 - Tony Blair 1997-2007
 - Gordon Brown 2007-2010
 - David Cameron 2010 - present



5. Tony Blair was the first Prime Minister to have been born during The Queen's reign. He was born in early May, 1953 - a month before the Coronation.
6. The Queen has attended every opening of Parliament except those in 1959 and 1963, when she was expecting Prince Andrew and Prince Edward respectively.
7. There have been six Archbishops of Canterbury during The Queen's reign (Geoffrey Fisher, Michael Ramsey, Donald Coggan, Robert Runcie, George Carey and Rowan Williams).
8. There have been six Roman Catholic Popes during The Queen's reign (Pius XII, John XXIII, Paul VI, John Paul I, John Paul II, Benedict XVI).
9. The Queen has received two Popes on visits to the UK (Pope John Paul II in 1982 and Pope Benedict XVI in 2010). Pope John Paul II's visit in 1982 was the first Papal visit to the United Kingdom for over 450 years. Her Majesty has officially visited the Vatican three times in her reign – in 1961 visiting Pope John XXIII and in 1980 and 2000 visiting Pope John Paul II.
10. The Queen is currently patron of over 600 charities and organisations, over 400 of which she has held since 1952.
11. Since 1952, The Queen has conferred over 404,500 honours and awards.
12. The Queen has personally held over 610 Investitures.
13. The first Investiture of the Queen's reign took place at Buckingham Palace on 27th February 1952. The first person to be presented was Private William Speakman, of The King's Own Scottish Borderers, who received the Victoria Cross for his actions during the Korean War.
14. The Queen has answered around three and a half million items of correspondence.
15. The Queen has sent over 175,000 telegrams to centenarians in the UK and the Commonwealth.
16. The Queen has sent almost 540,000 telegrams to couples in the UK and the Commonwealth celebrating their diamond wedding (60 years) anniversary.



17. The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh have sent approximately 45,000 Christmas cards during The Queen's reign.

18. The Queen has given out approximately 90,000 Christmas puddings to staff continuing the custom of King George V and King George VI

19. In 60 years, The Queen has undertaken 261 official overseas visits, including 96 State Visits, to 116 different countries.

20. Many of The Queen's official tours were on the Royal Yacht Britannia, launched on 16th April 1953 and commissioned for service on 7th January 1954. It was decommissioned in 1997. During this time, Britannia travelled more than a million miles on Royal and official duties.

21. The Royal Yacht Britannia was first used by The Queen when Her Majesty embarked with the Duke of Edinburgh on 1st May 1954 at Tobruk for the final stage of their Commonwealth Tour returning to the Pool of London. The last time The Queen was on board Britannia for an official visit was on the 9th August 1997 for a visit to Arran in Scotland.

22. In 60 years, The Queen has often travelled to her major Realms. Her Majesty has visited Australia 16 times, Canada 22 times, Jamaica 6 times and New Zealand 10 times.

23. The Queen's official visits have ranged from the Cocos Islands, 5.4 square miles with a population of 596, to The Peoples' Republic of China, with a population of 1.34 billion.

24. Unusual live gifts given to The Queen on foreign tours include: two tortoises given to The Queen in the Seychelles in 1972; a seven-year-old bull elephant called "Jumbo" given to Her Majesty by the President of Cameroon in 1972 to mark The Queen's Silver Wedding, and two black beavers given to The Queen after a Royal visit to Canada.

25. The only time The Queen has had to interrupt an overseas tour was in 1974 during a tour of Australia and Indonesia. The Queen was called back to the UK from Australia when a general election in the UK was suddenly called. The Duke of Edinburgh continued the programme in Australia, and The Queen re-joined the tour in Indonesia.

26. Her Majesty's first Commonwealth tour, began on 24 November 1953, and included visits to Canada, Bermuda, Jamaica, Panama, Fiji, Tonga, New Zealand, Australia, the Cocos Islands, Ceylon, Aden, Uganda, Libya, Malta and Gibraltar. Total distance covered was 43,618 miles.

27. The Queen made an historic visit to the Republic of Ireland in May 2011, the first visit by a British Monarch since Irish independence (King George V had visited in 1911).

28. There have been 102 inward State Visits from 1952 to the end of 2011

29. The first football match The Queen attended was the 1953 FA Cup Final.

30. The Queen has laid her wreath at the Cenotaph on Remembrance Sunday every year of her reign, except 1959, 1961, 1963, 1968, 1983 and 1999 when she pregnant or on an official visit.

31. The Queen has attended 56 Royal Maundy services in 43 Cathedrals during her reign. A total of 6,710 people have received Maundy Money in recognition of service to the Church and their communities.

32. The Queen has been at the saluting base of her troops in every Trooping the Colour ceremony since the start of her reign, with the exception of 1955, when a national rail strike forced its cancellation.

33. The Queen has attended 35 Royal Variety performances.

34. The Queen has launched 21 ships during her reign.

35. Since it was launched to mark The Queen's Golden Jubilee in 2002, The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service has been awarded to over 750 voluntary organisations across all four countries in the UK. Winners of the award have included scout groups, community radio stations, groups who care for the elderly and environmental charities.



36. Over the course of the reign, almost a one and a half million people have attended garden parties at Buckingham Palace or the Palace of Holyroodhouse.
37. The Queen has sat for 129 portraits during her reign.
38. The first 'Royal walkabout' took place during the visit by The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh to Australia and New Zealand in 1970. The practice was introduced to allow them to meet as many people as possible, not simply officials and dignitaries.
39. In 1969 the first television film about the family life of the Royal Family was made, and shown on the eve of the Investiture of Prince Charles as Prince of Wales.
40. 1962 a new gallery was opened at Buckingham Palace to display items from the Royal Collection. The brainchild of The Duke of Edinburgh, the new Queen's Gallery occupied the space of the Palace's bomb-damaged private chapel. It was the first time that parts of the Palace had been opened to the general public. The new Queen's Gallery was re-developed and re-opened in 2002 for the Golden Jubilee.
41. The Queen has made a Christmas Broadcast to the Commonwealth every year of her reign except 1969, when a repeat of the film 'Royal Family' was shown and a written message from The Queen issued. In 2002 The Queen made her 50th Christmas Broadcast and in 2004 The Queen issued her first separate broadcast for members of the British Armed Forces.
42. In 1953, The Queen made the first Christmas Broadcast from overseas, (rather than from the UK), broadcasting live from New Zealand. The first televised broadcast was in 1957, made live. The first pre-recorded broadcast took place in 1960 to allow transmission around the world. In 2006 the Christmas Broadcast was first made available to download as a podcast.
43. The Queen launched the British Monarchy's official website in 1997. In 2007 the official British Monarchy YouTube channel was unveiled, swiftly followed by a Royal Twitter site (2009), Flickr page (2010) and Facebook page (also 2010).
44. The Queen hosts "theme days" and Receptions to promote and celebrate aspects of British culture. Recent examples from 2011 include a reception for Young People and the Performing Arts and for Explorers. Other themes have included Publishing, Broadcasting, Tourism, Music,.
45. In an average year, The Queen will host more than 50,000 people at banquets, dinners, receptions and Garden Parties at Buckingham Palace. The Queen also hosts more than 8,000 people each year at garden parties and investitures at Holyroodhouse, during Holyrood Week.
46. The Queen was born at 17 Bruton St, London W1 on the 21st April, 1926, was christened on the 29th May, 1926 in the Private Chapel at Buckingham Palace and was confirmed on the 28th March, 1942 in the Private Chapel at Windsor Castle.
47. The Queen learnt to drive in 1945.
48. With the birth of Prince Andrew in 1960, The Queen became the first reigning Sovereign to have a child since Queen Victoria, who had her youngest child, Princess Beatrice, in 1857.
49. The Queen's real birthday is on 21st April, but it is celebrated officially in June.
50. During the Silver Jubilee year, The Queen toured 36 counties in the UK and Northern Ireland, starting in Glasgow on the 17th May. During her Golden Jubilee year The Queen toured 35 counties beginning in Cornwall on 1st May.
51. The Queen's first foreign tour of the Silver Jubilee year was a visit to Western Samoa, Tonga, Fiji, New Zealand, Australia and Papua New Guinea. The first foreign tour of The Queen's Golden Jubilee year was to Jamaica, New Zealand and Australia.
52. The Queen has 30 godchildren.



53. The Queen has owned more than 30 corgis during her reign, starting with Susan who was a present for her 18th birthday in 1944. A good proportion of these have been direct descendants from Susan. Her Majesty currently has three corgis – Monty, Willow and Holly.

54. The Queen also introduced a new breed of dog known as the "dorgi" when one of Her Majesty's corgis was mated with a dachshund named Pipkin belonging to Princess Margaret. There have been 11 dorgis.

55. The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh have been married for 64 years. They were married on the 20th November, 1947 in Westminster Abbey. The Queen's wedding dress was designed by Norman Hartnell and was woven at Winterthur Silks Limited, Dunfermline, in the Canmore factory, using silk made from Chinese silkworms at Lullingstone Castle.

56. The Queen's wedding ring was made from a nugget of Welsh gold which came from the Clogau St David's mine near Dolgellau. The official wedding cake was made by McVitie and Price Ltd, using ingredients given as a wedding gift by Australian Girl Guides.

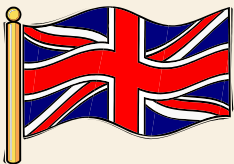
57. The wedding of The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh was the first and so far the only time in British history that the heir presumptive to the throne had been married.

58. The Queen's racing colours are a purple body with gold braid, scarlet sleeves and black velvet cap with gold fringe. They were adopted from those used by King Edward VII; one of his most successful horses was called Diamond Jubilee.

59. Queen Victoria was the last and to date the only British Monarch to celebrate a Diamond Jubilee. The Queen, who was aged 85 on Accession Day in 2012, is the oldest monarch to celebrate a Diamond Jubilee. Queen Victoria was 77 when she celebrated hers in 1897.

60. There have been three Diamond Jubilees of Heads of State throughout the world during The Queen's reign. King Bhumibol Adulyadej of Thailand celebrated 60 years on the throne in 2006; the former Sultan of Johor celebrated his in 1955; and the late Emperor Hirohito of Japan celebrated his in 1986.

### Look after your property

You may or may not be aware that there has  
been a spate of burglaries in Slip End and  
Caddington recently. Ken Crossett (Parish  
Council Chairman) has been in contact with  
Inspector Jim Hitch of Bedfordshire Police to

## Editors column

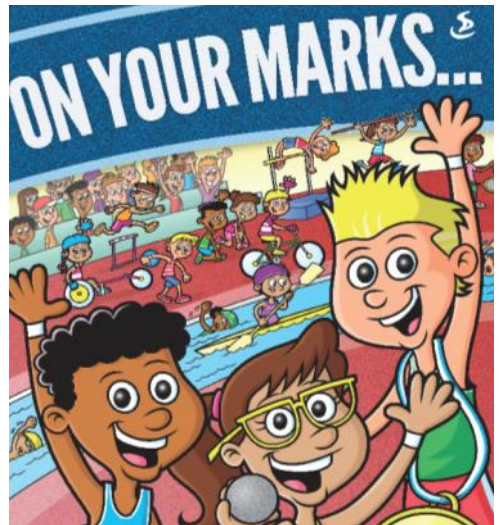

I don't think our kids know what an apron is. The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath because she only had a few. 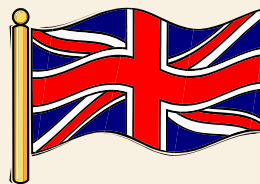
