Slip End United finished the season in style with a resounding 5–1 victory over East Anglian Combination side Thetford Rovers on Saturday 25th May 2013, to win the Ted Zipfel trophy, played at Carrow Road, the home of Norwich City.

Slip End was always in control after good inter link play from Carl Inns and Ryan Keeble resulted in a penalty, which Newman Carney made no mistake with after just 8 minutes. The lead was doubled 15 minutes in when the impressive Alex Howells' crashed home a 25 yard volley, which was then followed when Newman Carney lobbed the stranded keeper from fully 35 yards. Slip End was playing some fine football and almost extended their lead when Joe Batham hit the post and a Carl Inns' shot was well saved, then Cam Nagle scored a sublime 4th just before the break.

The second half continued in similar vein when Rory Nagle's perfect through ball sent Cam Nagle clear who lobbed the keeper in fine style. Deon Putnam went close with a free kick, Seb Prothero had a shot well saved before Thetford Rovers scored a consolation goal 5 minutes from time. Club Captain Joe Flemons received the trophy on behalf of his jubilant team mates who celebrated a memorable success. Newman Carney so impressed on the day that he has now had two offers of professional football, one from Cambridge and the other from Dagenham & Redbridge, so whilst SEU lose him next season, they wish him all the luck!

Mv sponsorship of boxer **Iason** Cunningham arose following a visit to St Paul's Academy in Hull (who trained Olympic Gold medal winner Luke Campbell). I went there to see an evening of professional boxing but my real motive was to seek advice on some technical aspects of a thriller I am writing in which boxing features on the undercard. After chatting to various personnel there I was asked whether I may be interested in sponsoring one of their boxers in a new scheme they were then launching. While I said no initially, back at home I decided to call them and request a CV on two of the boxers seeking support.

Once I read Jason's CV I was hooked on the idea. His record as an amateur up to a year earlier was absolutely immaculate. He had won all the major ABA titles and had also

landed their exclusive Elite trophy, the highest honour that could be won.

I decided immediately to take Jason on and since we met last September he has won 3 fights, including the 4th round stoppage of former British and Commonwealth title contender Usman Ahmed at Doncaster's Keep Moat Stadium on May 11th. This made 8 wins out of 8 fights since turning professional. It was this last encounter which landed him his first Belt, the International Masters, which he kindly donated to me!

In July Jason will be fighting for the English Flyweight crown and his opponent will be Scott Gladwin. Jason is an excellent boxer in which his pace and punching power is matched by dedication and determination, the latter two qualities can always be witnessed in his strenuous daily training routines. He fights for his family including two young daughters (Madison and Hailey), his coaches from St Paul's and a fast growing legion of fans.

I fully expect him to take the Flyweight title and later this year we both feel that the British and Commonwealth titles are well within our sights. Jason, aged 23 years lives in Doncaster and visits South Bedfordshire regularly. We have set up a business together – Pure Instinct, to help promote his career. We started with a launch of Team Cunningham sportswear which proved popular with his supporters. Plans are in hand for more merchandising.

Parish Council Notes

High Speed Broadband Update

Around this time last year, part of the Parish had access to high speed broadband. However, this left the rest of us a bit 'miffed' and many attempts had been made by residents to find out from BT when the rest of the Parish would be connected. The Parish Council had been in touch with Olivia Garfield the Chief Executive at Open Reach. Reading between the lines my impression was that there was some debate as to the financial viability for Open Reach to connect up another box but that has never been confirmed. Over then to Central Beds for as you may recall the Government set up the grant scheme, Broadband Delivery UK, This is to enable rural locations to have access to broadband at speeds of not less than 2 Mbps.

Cllr Wenham, who is the executive member looking after the project, gave us an update recently, "As you would expect there are many Parishes across Central Beds Council in a similar or worse position to Slip End with regard to High Speed Broadband. Over the last two weeks I have raised Slip End's situation again with BT and hope for a response soon. Central Beds Council's own BDUK project has now entered its tender phase and responses from providers including BT are expected in August. We hope to award the contract during quarter 3 this year with installation over the next three years. Pending the tender responses we do not know which addresses will benefit from the BDUK grant which is designed to enable

superfast access to 90% of dwellings across the CBC area." For the time being at any rate we will need to keep our fingers crossed that all the Parish will be included in the 90%

The Cross Roads Grand Prix?

I have not quite decided yet if Formula 1 has set up a second British Grand Prix or are we such an unwelcoming place, people can't wait to pass through? The speed data shows that the highest speed recorded in Markyate Road was 85 mph and you would have seen it had you been around at 5pm. Had that vehicle not knocked you down the two coming in, from the opposite direction at 8.45pm doing 70 mph may have.

Or perhaps we frighten car drivers, one individual managed to reach 80 mph at 7pm heading towards Newlands Road whereas one person coming in on Church Road from Newlands at 12.45 in the afternoon reached a sedate 70 mph. Front Street, saw its highest speed one morning at 8am when 65 mph was reached in the 30 mph zone coming towards the cross roads. 65 mph was the highest speed for vehicles going in the opposite direction achieved by no less than seven vehicles.

These were the highest speeds recorded in the week beginning 16 April. I am sure you will find that as frightening as I do. I will leave it for the exhibition to show you the rest of the data which frankly is equally startling. In the next issue, which will be September, I will speak about the speed data for lower and Upper Woodside. (cont.....)

God's gift of Holidays

I have recently returned from a week's holiday staying with my sister and brother-in-law in the Lake District. I spent a wonderful week walking in beautiful countryside, chatting, eating food I hadn't prepared, worshipping in a church I wasn't responsible for, reading and a couple of trips to the theatre. Oh yes and a train journey! What could be better! All wonderfully relaxing and refreshing and I returned with batteries fully charged for the final half term before the summer school holidays.

Holidays were always part of God's plan for us. We are not made to work all the time! A balance between work and rest, expending energy and re-creative leisure was built into God's pattern from the beginning. He himself rested after the work of creation and enjoyed what he had accomplished.

God gave to his people a Sabbath, one day in every seven when there was a break in the routines of existence and the opportunity to worship him, to have time to focus on the bigger picture, to learn and grow spiritually. This was time to enjoy being community, to spend time with family and friends.

Then there was an annual cycle of festivals described in the Old Testament when his people could have longer periods to remember the ways in which he had blessed them in the past and to return to him in the present. Some of these were serious religious festivals, with lots of soul searching and recommitment. Some were much more light hearted and sound like lots of fun. Some of them meant going to Jerusalem where there was the excitement of

travelling with friends. of joyful processions and ceremonies in the temple. In Deuteronomy, Moses commands the people to set aside a tithe, a tenth of all the produce of the fields, then go to Jerusalem and with the tithe "Buy whatever you like, cattle, sheep, wine or other fermented drink... then eat there in presence of the Lord rejoice." (Deuteronomy 14v26) It sounds to me rather like a command to have a party!

Our modern word holiday comes from the Old English word Haligdaeg, literally Holy Day, a day that God gave to his people, a day to draw close to him, and rejoice in him.

I hope that you are able to enjoy some "time out" over the summer, and whether you go away or not, you are able to enjoy God's creation, enjoy family and friends, have time for reflection, rest and re-creation and to enjoy it as a gift from God.

At St. Andrew's we do less over the summer – so that those who work very hard over the year can take time out too. We have a break from Kidztime and Care Home and other extra services but our normal worship at 10.30am each Sunday morning continues. Maybe as

part of your Holy Days you could take the time to come to church to thank him for work and also to thank him for his gift of leisure.

DO YOU WANT TO STOP COMMERCIAL COMPANIES HAVING ACCESS TO YOUR DETAILS ON THE ELECTORAL REGISTER?

Important changes to your details on the electoral register

From October this year there will be changes to the way that you can protect your details on the electoral register should you not wish them to be sold to third parties.

There are two versions of the electoral register – the **full register**, which only certain organisations can access and the **edited register**, which anyone can buy. Your details will appear on the edited register unless you ask for them to be removed. Currently 117,000 people within Central Bedfordshire Council area have requested their name and address to be excluded from the edited version of the register.

In the past we carried over requests to be excluded from the edited register, but we will no longer be allowed to do this. If you want to have your details permanently excluded from the edited register you can write to us at Priory House, Monks Walk, Chicksands SG17 5TQ or email us at:-

electoral.registration@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk making a permanent opt-out request.

Please ensure that you state your full name and address and that you wish your details to be excluded from the edited register on a permanent basis or until further notice. A separate request is required for each member of the household if they also wish to be permanently omitted from the edited register.

Refurbishment Work

To start this year's work programme the floors in the extension, loos and passageway have been completely reworked. Some idea of the overall improvements to significantly enhance the appearance of the hall, can be seen in the extension, where one of the wall panels has been repainted in clean, neutral colours to complement the new floor. Thanks to those who have commented positively on what has been achieved so far; there is universal opinion that the ghastly 'terra cotta' will soon disappear! Decoration and work on the floor in the body of the hall will be undertaken in the summer.

A solution to 'Shortfalls'

Several of our vital organisations have been suffering as we all have with huge increases in costs during the present economic situation. Those organisations have been, and will continue to be, supported by the Village Hall, which operates a policy of reduced rates for local groups. However, VH has suffered more than most while hire fees received from local groups have withered well below even discounted VH rates. Result has been a deterioration of a previously healthy VH bank balance to a dangerously low level!

The dichotomy is to find a solution which will not cripple our vital local organisations yet seek to restore VH contingency funds which will be needed when unforeseen essential work is required. The VH management committee this and solutions are becoming apparent.

Having grasped all that, the reader may wonder how funds for refurbishment have been forthcoming? A good question: the answer allow the VHMC to decide what's best. offers great hope to our local organisations.

Generous grant assistance has been received by the VH in 2013. The Community Projects Group led the way with a grant for refurbishment of £2500 and then another grant to meet hire charge 'shortfalls' by local groups. These were followed by a refurbishment grant of over £5000 from the Bedfordshire & Luton Community Foundation. The lesson is that more grant aid should be sought all round in order to help meet running costs, both for the organisations and the VH

We would be pleased to discuss this at length with groups and organisations which, like the VH, are struggling with funding in these difficult days.

The VH hosted a very pleasant occasion in May when 70 of us of all ages, turned out to be entertained by Peter Smith's Ukulele Ensemble. The programme suited all tastes with much 'singing along'. Work in Progress

During the half term break contractors were in dealing with the floors in the Village Hall. The work overran a little causing cancellation of a Play Group session. The VHMC apologises for the disruption and trust that the improvements in the appearance of the VH will be for the better for everyone in the slightly longer run. Work will members have been scratching their heads about resume over the summer with attention to the main floor and eagerly anticipated re-decoration. **The** tired, unloved 'terra cotta' will go at last, to be replaced by lightness and brightness. One panel has been repainted already, in a couple of tones to

Gardeners' Special

Everything seems to be late this year because the winter went on for so long. As a matter of fact I am sitting here writing this in a jumper instead of a T-shirt and the central heating is still coming on in the mornings! The few odd warm days we have had seem to have started things moving in the garden and hopefully, by the time you are reading this, summer will be here.

In the greenhouse tomatoes and cucumbers should be bearing fruit; a liquid fertiliser should be applied every 7-10 days to encourage the fruits to ripen. Blackcurrants can be pruned after fruiting, cutting out the old wood, tie in new shoots of blackberries and loganberries but keep them separate from the fruiting shoots. Summer fruiting raspberries can be cut down as the fruiting canes are finished, but leave the new shoots because they will bear next year's crop. Tidy up the strawberry bed when the fruits are finished.

Complete planting of leeks this month as well as late Brussels sprouts, winter cabbage and spring broccoli, also plant swedes by the middle of the month. Keep pinching out the side shoots of tomato plants (except bush varieties) to get decent size fruits. If the weather is hot and dry and there isn't a hosepipe ban, then water the lawn regularly, aerate by spiking with a fork as this will help the water penetrate well below the surface where it's needed to keep it looking green.

Gladioli will not need staking for normal garden use but keep well watered and weed free. Irises can be divided and replanted this month and cut the top half of the leaves off to avoid wind damage. July is the month when lilies are at their best and unless you want to save the seed they should be deadheaded as the flowers fade, water carnations and pinks if the weather is dry. Early this month sow sweet williams and wall flowers for colour in the spring. Rock gardens will

look somewhat drab from now until autumn but best to keep the weeds down to prevent the alpines from being overwhelmed. Patio containers and hanging baskets will require watering at least once a day and deadhead to keep them looking their best.

Deadhead roses on a regular basis to encourage a second flush in the autumn and keep an eye out for greenfly, black spot, mildew and rust. Tie young stems of dahlias to their supports with soft string or raffia and if large blooms are required then disbud the lower buds to get long stems for cutting and arranging in a vase. Chrysanthemums can be treated the same way, but spray varieties should be left, although stake and tie-in shoots to avoid wind damage. Prune deciduous shrubs such as Jasmine and Philadelphus after flowering by removing spent flowers and weak shoots.

You should now be enjoying the fruits of your labour as plenty of fresh vegetables, such as lettuce, carrots, beetroot, potatoes, cabbage and broad beans are large enough to

harvest and the garden should be in full of colour as mother nature amazes us once again, so till next month, happy gardening.



the four-year-old grandson of John & Wendy Barton of



James was born a healthy happy baby but a severe bout of tonsillitis when he was just three years old caused him to have a seizure. This triggered off inside him the symptoms of the rare condition.

His mum Angela Barton, who was born and went to school in Slip End, says his mitochondria, the 'batteries' which power all of his cells, don't function properly. He needs to take a cocktail of vitamins 3 times a day. She said: "Most people do not know about the disease, it is very rare. It isn't a

good outlook for James, so we don't know how long we have with him. No-one can tell us. Currently there is no treatment available for James so those around him are completing two sponsored bike rides for The Lily Foundation, which not only provides support for sufferers' families, but also funds research into finding a cure for this disease.



Twenty-four of the family's closest friends and relatives, including James's dad Iain, have formed a team called "The Stupid Peddlars" cycled from London to Brighton in June, and will do so again in September. They have so far raised more than £5000. Wendy's friends at Slip End Line Dancing Group have generously donated £115 in sponsorship.
