
choosing, transporting, watering, digging the hole and planting the Christmas Tree we had at the Village Hall. And thanks for dismantling, chopping and disposing of it too!



SLIP END GARDENING CLUB

At the November meeting an interesting and informative presentation was given by Bev Bond on "The Swiss Garden". Bev had previously worked at the "Garden" and gave details of its history as well as changes over time. The Swiss Garden was the brainchild of Lord Ongley, who was apparently motivated by the 1820s fashion for all things alpine, itself inspired by the craze for holidaying in the Swiss Alps. Ongley built the estate village of Old Warden on a similar alpine theme; apparently he expected his workers to sport rustic red neckerchiefs as he came by in his carriage.

The Swiss Garden has just reopened 18-month following restoration an process funded to the tune of £2.8 million by the Heritage Lottery Fund. The work done is first-class and as such represents good value for money in these straitened times. Especially given that there are 13 listed structures of delicate character on the site, and a substantial amount of tree clearing and replanting of shrubs has been achieved. The Gardening Club made a visit in April 2011 and following the improvement works undertaken will be visiting again soon. Due to the variety of different area layouts, you could visit several times a vear.

The talk was followed by the annual social finger buffet provided by members along with drinks to finish off the year.

Planning has started for the 2015 Village Plant Sale, to be held on Saturday 16th May and the programme of National Garden Scheme visits for the year is being prepared. More details next month.

St Valentine

Who was St Valentine? Why do we celebrate his day as a day for those we love?



St. Valentine's Day began as a liturgical celebration of one or more early Christian saints named Valentinus. Several martyrdom stories were invented for the various Valentines that belonged to February 14th. A popular account of Saint Valentine of Rome states that he was imprisoned for performing weddings for soldiers who were forbidden to marry and for ministering to Christians, who were persecuted under the Roman Empire. According to legend, during his imprisonment, he healed the daughter of his jailer. An embellishment to this story states that before his execution he wrote her a letter signed "Your Valentine" as a farewell.

The day was first associated with romantic love in the Middle Ages. In 18th-century England, it evolved into an occasion in which lovers expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, sweets and cards (known as "valentines"). In Europe, Saint Valentine's Keys are given to lovers "as a romantic symbol and an invitation to unlock the giver's heart". Symbols used today include heart shapes, Doves and the winged Cupid. More recently this changed to mass produced greetings cards. Happy Valentine's Day!

Good Neighbours make safe neighbourhoods

Look out for your neighbours

Get to know your neighbours. They will know who shouldn't be around your home and garden when you're away. Perhaps you could start a Neighbourhood Watch or Street Watch scheme where you live? Any suspicions should be reported to the Police

Secure your gates, windows and doors

Stop burglars getting in without being seen by keeping back gates and sheds securely locked, hedges and trees trimmed and fencing fixed. Make sure all with a windows and doors are locked securely and fit intruder alarms. Don't let burglars have easy access to your home.

Switch On Lights

If you are out or returning home after dark, leave lights on to create the impression you're at home. If you can use light timers and outdoor sensory lights or leave a radio or TV on to deter ov.uk burglars.

Immobilise

Register valuable and sentimental belongings on the national property database, Immobilise. This helps the Police to identify items and arrest and charge anyone responsible.

Remember—Lock up, Light up

- •Leave some lights on if it will be dark before you get home or use light timers.
- •If you can, leave a radio on to create the impression that someone's home.
- •Fit intruder alarms, door chains and door locks.
- •Lock garages, sheds and all windows.
- Don't leave keys or valuables where they can be seen from doors or windows.
- •Never hide spare keys outside, such as under a flowerpot. It's the first place burglars look.
- •Register valuables or sentimental items with a serial number at www.immobilise.com
- •Always check who is at the door. You don't need to open if you feel anxious.






