THE HOBBY PAGE

Gone Fishing!

Perhaps it might be a good idea to start by quoting Rob Beatie, writing in *The Telegraph* in 2014.



"Fishing may be the most popular participatory sport in the UK, but most people don't have a clue what actually goes on out there on our rivers, lakes, and seas. The average Briton has his or her fair share of preconceptions about fishing, of course. It's boring. It's always raining. Only old people go fishing. Only old blokes go fishing. The only fish you ever catch are tiny (yet in every pond there is a giant pike big enough to swallow a swan whole.)

A popular sport it certainly must be, but numbers are difficult to determine accurately and vary from 1million in the UK to over 2million. The number of licences issued is a reasonable guide, assuming that all anglers buy one, and that number in recent years has hovered around the 1.2million."

One of these keen sportsmen is John Moss from Pepperstock. He first attempted fishing at the age of 7 from the canal near his home in Hemel Hempstead. Unusually, perhaps, this was not because his father or elder brother fished. Rather, he picked a piece of cane, waxed a length of cotton and, using a bent pin as a hook, began a love of fishing lasting throughout his life.

By the time he reached his 10th Birthday (sorry but this has to be said somewhere) he was hooked. He went to the local fishing tackle shop and bought a plastic centre pin reel, a decent line and cane rod. He met some keen members of the Hatfield District Angling Club as a Junior Member. He is still, after 40 years, an active member of the Verulam

Angling Club. Considered by many to be a solitary sport, a view which he disputes and which is born out by the many friends he has made and with whom he has kept in contact. There are club activities which all his family could join in with him and so it is a choice each individual makes.

It is often the case that, after a stressful day, nothing could be more restful than to get together all the kit necessary, drive a short distance and take a position on the river, lake or canal bank. Then, open the hip flask and start to fish.

Much of the pleasure which John gains comes from his preparation. Reading the fishing magazines and then selecting the best equipment he can afford. The joy of making rigs has always been one of the most satisfying parts of the sport and something which occupies the closed river months in the Spring and early Summer.

Competition fishing is a part of the pastime which many enjoy. It can be very challenging and intense, but at the end of the day everyone becomes a friend and wishes you better 'luck' next time.

In each of these pieces on Hobbies and Pastimes we have tried to give some idea of costs. Most, if not all such activities, can be expensive and fishing is no exception. As always you buy to suit your wallet. A carbon fibre rod can cost several thousand pounds and with extensions, line and reel many hundreds can be added. However, that is not essential by any means and such numbers should not deter you from starting to fish.

The single, most helpful advice John offers to the aspiring fisherman is **Join A Club**. Meet and take advice from experienced anglers before you invest time and money. Don't be too proud to ask. There is so much more in his story which will appear in a later issue of *Parish News*.

November Parish Council Meeting Report

Routine matters were dealt with and then time was given to reports from Cllr. Minnighan and Mr Prothero who had made the visit to a supplier of Playground Equipment as reported in the last issue of Parish News. The range of equipment available from this outlet had decreased significantly and further investigation would be required. Finance for this programme has been approved and when a suitable supplier is found the various pieces of equipment will be put before the public for selection. This is now anticipated during 2019. The choice will benefit all age groups and abilities, who will find equipment to increase fitness or simply for fun.

The replacement Gritter had been purchased to be used to help clear roads which are not under the CBC road clearance programme in the event of bad weather. Repairs to the seats in the bus shelter would be carried out.

The CPG/GNS events were announced by Cllr. Patterson and details appear elsewhere in this issue.

In response to questions, County Cllrs Stay and Collins told the meeting that a revised plan for the Retirement Village in Markyate Road was in preparation which, it is hoped, will overcome objections raised by the public at an earlier consultation. No plans had been submitted for the construction of a Waste Incinerator but the concerns of Villagers had been reported to the County planning team and would be discussed in detail when and if a plan is submitted

In reply to a question asking why Central Bedfordshire helped fund the policing at Luton Airport, it was stated that this had historical foundations, which were agreed since the cover included significant vulnerable areas surrounding the airport within the County Council's responsibilities.

in monumental brasses, stained and painted glass, mausoleums, and the different Saints after whom many of the churches are named. A couple of facts from the talk:- The origin of the word steeplechase came from the horse races that used to be held from one church to another, the first of which was in Harlington in 1830. The Black Death in 1349 caused the death of many priests, and in 53 of the Bedfordshire churches there was at least one new incumbent in that year.

A message from Rev. Cathy Pullinger

This year we are holding what we are calling a "Blue Christmas" Carol service. (Dec 9th at 3pm.) It is for those for whom Christmas will not be easy this year – perhaps because of bereavement or a serious illness, family breakdown or redundancy. If this is you, please feel very warmly invited.

We will be singing a song by Graham Kendrick – it gives Mary's perspective – the normal joy of bringing a child into the world was tinged with uncertainty and foreboding. When she took the baby Jesus into the temple to present him to the Lord, a man, Simeon, who was in the temple praying had a word of prophecy for Mary. He said that he had now seen God's salvation and that he could now die in peace, but that a sword would pierce her heart also. One day she would see him dying on a cross, bearing the sins of the world in his flesh.

It was a tremendous privilege for Mary to bear Jesus, to be the means by which God sent his saviour into the world, but it was not without cost. It seems to me that to achieve change for good in this world, to follow God's saving ways we will have to walk a costly path. A path that is always worth it because then we see the goodness of God in this world – the transformation he can bring into people's lives - the salvation he came to bring.

The song is called "Thorns in the straw" and repeats the words "so bitter and so sweet" in several of the verses. Included is the phrase ...and as she laid him down to sleep, she wondered - will it always be so bitter and so sweet.

Crime prevention over the Christmas period

Ensuring the safety of your property is important at all times, however, Christmas and New Year can be a time when those opportunists with ill intent are out and about.

A number of years ago, neighbours of mine had a visiting relative who arrived outside the house and went to greet the family. By the time they went to unpack the car, all the presents had gone! Everyone was understandably quite devastated!

Remember to take care and don't leave presents and goodies easily visible or accessible. Make sure doors and windows are locked. Look out for your neighbours and friends, especially the elderly or those who are alone.

If you are going away over the festive period, try to leave your house and other property as safe as possible.

The wide use of social media these days, tempts us to tell the world when we are off on holiday or away from home. Be wary of this. Maybe it is safer to tell people about it after you have got home again. Surely your friends can wait a few days for those exciting photos to be posted!

In the mean time,... Have an enjoyable, happy and safe Christmas and New Year!

Gardening Notes from Russell Sprout

It's nearly Christmas again and as usual I am still trying to figure out where the year has gone! If the weather is dry, continue digging vacant ground and finish tidying up beds and borders. If you haven't done so already clean and lubricate mowers before putting away for the winter.

Prune climbing roses now, cutting away diseased or damaged growth and tie in any new shoots to their support. Prune older flowered side shoots back by two thirds of their length. Start to winter prune your Wisteria, cutting back summer side shoots to 2 or 3 buds. Leave the faded flower heads on your Hydrangeas until the spring, they will provide frost protection to the swelling buds further down the stems.

Damp leading to botrytis mildew is the major problem in the greenhouse, so ventilate on dry days and reduce any watering to the absolute minimum. Lag outdoor taps and drain hoses and spray guns until dry to prevent frost damage. If we have heavy falls of snow this winter knock the snow off the branches of trees and shrubs to prevent them from breaking under the weight of the snow.

Remove fallen leaves from alpines and rockeries, fork over between plants with a hand fork and remove weeds. Examine dahlia tubers, if shrivelled plunge in tepid water overnight and if any are starting to rot cut off damaged part and dust with flowers of sulphate. Spray fruit trees with a tar-oil winter wash this month or next to kill eggs of pests laid earlier in the year. Tar-oil can be sprayed on all fruit except strawberries. Keep a check for mice damage amongst stored fruit and vegetables and also amongst autumn sown peas and broad beans and take appropriate action.

Recycle as much waste as you can on the compost heap and burn any woody matter that won't break down, but check carefully for hibernating hedgehogs before starting a bonfire.

The seed catalogues are available now but remember, it is first come first served so get that order in as soon as possible. Remember when comparing a modern F1 hybrid against an older open pollinated type that the F1 will always mature in the same week, whereas the open pollinated varieties will crop over several weeks.

AIRPORT'S AIRSPACE CHANGE IS JUDGED "UNWORKABLE" BY NATS

For over a year, as members will know, the airport has been meeting Focus Group representatives including LADACAN to design flight path changes to try to alleviate noise on its westerly departure route past Brookmans Park. Delegates were told that aircraft would be able to reach higher altitudes sooner, and that new respite route options were possible to share the load.

After a year's work, the airport checked with air traffic services (NATS) and was told that the plans were unworkable because of conflicts with planes from Heathrow and Stansted. We had frequently raised these potential issues but were told that negotiations with other airports were going well.

In fact they came to nothing, and the best on offer until the whole airspace is redesigned (which will take years) is a slight tweak to the centre line of the track, and the option to climb to 5,000ft rather than holding at 4,000ft.

Meantime the CAA's review of the original RNAV implementation is due by the end of the year: our feeling is that we should wait and see what it says and also to press for a more joined-up airspace planning process.


