Message from St Andrew's Deeds Not Words

This year marks the centenary of the Representation of the People Act which gave women the vote, or more precisely gave some women the vote. Men were allowed to vote at 21, whereas women were allowed to vote at 30 if they owned property valued over £5 or had a husband who did. The law was passed in large part due to the campaigning of the Women's Social and Political Union (the Suffragettes) whose maxim was "Deeds Not Words".

In the aftermath of #metoo, the BBC equal pay debate, etc., celebrations are overshadowed with reflections on how much more needs to be done.

You might be forgiven for thinking that sex, politics and religion are taboo, and the church has no business expressing a view on these matters. But as Christians we do have a stake in these debates. We want to demonstrate what renewed relationships in Christ look like, and that includes between men and women in different spheres of life. We are called to do this with deeds as well as words.

The original Suffragette slogan, 'Deeds Not Words', was a call to radical action. The Gospel is nothing if not radical. The slogan chimes with the statement in James 2: 14-26 that faith without works is dead, a call for us to live out our faith, to walk the talk, if you like.

One way of showing what Kingdom relationships look like is by promoting trade justice.

We will be holding a Big Brew Coffee Morning at the Vicarage on 10th March from 10.30am to noon to raise funds for Traidcraft Exchange whose mission is to create a world freed from the scandal of poverty, where trade is just, and people

and communities can flourish.

We will also be honouring women as part of our Mothering Sunday Family Service. Like other churches, we at St Andrew's give the children in the congregation a little bunch of spring flowers to give to their mothers as a thank you for all their care and love throughout the year.

We also show our appreciation to those who do not have children of their own but have shown maternal care and concern, and we remember mums who are no longer with us. We would love you to join us.

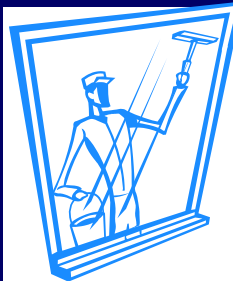

OUR FARMING YEAR

Angela Speirs of J Speirs & Son, Pepsal End Farm, provides a monthly insight into agricultural life

During the cold, wet month of February we continue to load out wheat and oats from the farm and calving continues in the herd. The wheat is heading to Whitworths in Wellingborough and the oats head to European Oat Millers at Bedford where we have joined their benchmarking group with the aim of minimising our inputs at the same time as improving the quality of our oats by comparing our production figures with other producers.

We are currently on the farm servicing farm equipment in the workshop and refurbishing some old farm buildings in readiness for new occupancy in the spring. Our hedge cutting has to be finished by the end of February too as we must not impinge on the bird nesting season about to begin in the spring. Also in February we try to start mending and fencing grass fields in readiness for cattle turnout. This is a timely job and

every year there seems to be fencing that needs to be replaced.

The cattle sheds have to be mucked out every two/three weeks in order to keep the cow's bedded straw sheds as clean and germ free as possible. Fresh straw – either wheat or barley – is littered in amongst the cows in their yards every other day. The straw spreader used to do this job is attached to the front of a JCB forklift which then shakes and spreads the straw all over the yard. Some cows and particularly the calves see this as playtime and gad about under and in the straw being thrown about.

I am sure, as everyone else must be, we all yearn to see the warmer, drier weather of spring in order to nurture the crops, watch the grass grow and to enable us all to get on the land and about our daily chores with a little more ease.



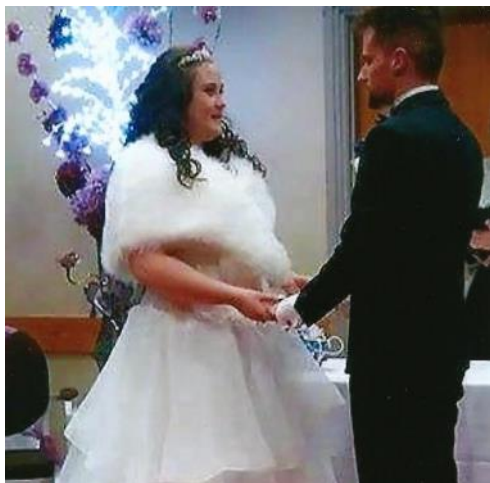
Family celebrations

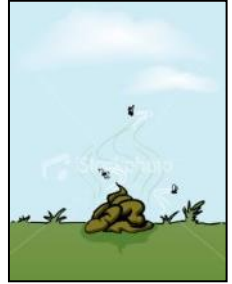

Scoop the Poop!

Dog Poo – we've all stepped in it at some time in our lives. Some of us are unfortunate enough to then walk it through our houses, leaving a trail of devastation in our wake.

It is estimated that the UK dog population (between 6.5 and 7.4 million) produce 1,000 tonnes of excrement per day.

Now for the technical bit:



A Parish Council has the authority to make a Dog Control Order to provide controls on the handling and behaviour of dogs on areas of land within their authority. **There are five different types of dog control offences for which an order can be made. One of these is the 'fouling of Land by Dogs Order – Offence of failing to remove dog faeces'. The MAXIMUM fine in a Magistrates Court is £1,000.**

According to research by ENCAM, those members of the public that let their dog foul the pavement:

- don't believe they'll ever be caught
- didn't think the fine could be enforced
- only admit that their dog has fouled the pavement when pressed to admit it

Ever heard of **Toxocariasis**? It is the infection of humans with the larvae of a genus of roundworms, *Toxocara*, of dogs and cats. It can cause swelling of the liver and sometimes damage to the eyes and no, there isn't a useful treatment OR cure for it.

Toxocara eggs are not infectious until they embryonate. This is usually at least 2 – 3 weeks after they have been deposited by a dog. **Therefore, freshly deposited faeces are not infectious, and you can safely clear up after your dog.**

Please do so – Front Street in particular is suffering from some recent deposits which have been invisible to the untrained eye and poor unsuspecting parishioners who have walked in it, taking it with them on their shoes to their home, school, car.

We all have to live in and walk around the parish, let's make it more pleasurable to do without having to dodge the poo. If your dog poos, clear it up.

Enviro Crime (<http://www.centralbedfordshire.gov.uk/waste/litter/dog-fouling.aspx>) have been advised of the areas currently suffering from poo build up in the Parish and patrols will be established.

Gardening Tips *by Russell Sprout*

Being a gardener is never dull, you never know what mother nature is going to throw at you, hopefully by the time you are reading this article the relentless rain will have stopped and you can get on with some of those tidying up jobs that need doing after the long winter.

If you have any large clumps of snowdrops they can be dug up and split into small bunches and replanted straight away, but this should only be done about every fifth year.

Lawns will need some attention after the rigours of winter, new lawns need a final raking of ground dug in the autumn to a fine tilth for sowing seed. Established lawns will benefit from a good scarifying with a lawn rake or an electric scarifier to remove dead grass, moss and thatch.

Any worn areas can be reseeded and any sunken areas levelled and seeded to bring it back to a good condition for the year ahead. The first time you cut, don't cut too short, lower the blades over the next few mowings. Trim and straighten edges angling the cut slightly away from you to avoid it crumbling away.

Plant roses early in the month and prune established plants during a frost free period, cutting out all dead wood and any branches criss-crossing to open up and shape the bush to a bowl shape. Don't be afraid of cutting a rose back too far as they benefit from a really good reduction of the previous year's growth to produce strong new shoots.

Gladioli corms can be planted later this month and if sown over the next six weeks will give a longer flowering season. Sow between four to six inches deep and you will avoid the need to stake them.

Dahlias and chrysanthemums overwintered in the greenhouse will have

shoots on them by now and cuttings can be taken when they are approximately three inches long. Sweet peas which were sown in autumn and over-wintered in pots or bought from a nursery will need to be planted out as soon as the weather permits. They make an effective display when grown in clumps and supported with pea sticks or a cylinder of netting.

Leeks can be sown this month for transplanting in June and summer spinach sown this month will be ready in May/June. Sow early-rounded peas and broad beans until mid month.

Onion sets can be planted towards the end of the month or early next month, but shallots should be planted as soon as possible if not already done. Tomatoes sown last month under heat will need pricking out now or they will become weak and spindly.

Finish pruning established fruit trees and bushes as soon as possible in the month.

Early potatoes can be planted from the middle of the month 9-12 inches deep and 14 inches apart, but as they shoot above ground they will need to be protected from frost.

Main crop Brussels sprouts can be sown early in the month in drills half an inch deep for planting out at the end of April. Parsnips can also go in as soon as the soil is dry in drills half an inch deep and 15 inches apart, if you sow three seeds at six inch spacings this will make it a lot easier when it comes to thinning out.

News in brief

Smalls for All

Rotary Technology Tournament

For many years Rotary Clubs in the UK have run an annual Technology Tournament designed both to stimulate the interest of students in design and technology and to improve their personal skills and team building to meet the needs of industry.

Since 1989 the nine Rotary Clubs in Luton and Central Bedfordshire have played their part in this overall event and organised what is now one of the largest tournaments in the country.

Each year students in teams of four are required to design and build a working model only from materials supplied. Neither the students nor their teachers are aware of the project until the day.

Tasks in previous years have ranged from lifting bridges to gas pipe inspection vehicles made using, sometimes, electric motors or elastic bands to operate the design.

The tournament is designed for students in three categories: Foundation students aged 7-9 years, Intermediate students aged 10-11 years and Advanced students aged from 12 years up to 18.

Teams are assessed by Rotarian judges and particular attention is paid to team working, portfolio development which includes drawings and explanation of how the model will work, building and testing of the finished model in accordance with strict guidelines laid down by the tournament organisers. The event concludes with the winners in each

category being presented with a shield and each team member receiving a certificate. A keynote speech is given by a specialist working in the area relevant to the design project for that year.

This year the tournament is again well attended with a total of 42 teams comprising 22 foundation, 12 intermediate and 8 advanced students in competition to be held, as before, at Stopsley Baptist Church, Luton on Thursday 8th March.

Any local winners will be revealed in a future issue of Parish News.

Citing government commitments to further aviation growth, LLAL is making an opportunistic pitch claiming it will deliver huge economic benefit to the region in a sustainable way by increasing Luton's capacity to 36-38 million passengers and 240,000 flights a year, all off the existing single runway.
