Parish Council Update

The latest Parish Council Meeting was held on **Monday 2nd November** as a virtual Zoom Meeting.

One Planning Application was discussed this month:

CB/20/03894/FULL – Land next to 66 Woodside Road, Woodside – Erection of two detached bungalows.

It was agreed that the Parish Council should lodge a "No Objection" comment to CBC Planning.

Several residents had expressed concerns that the Woodside Park Homes estate was working on constructing new concrete bases on the site. It was agreed the Vice Chair would write to CBC Planning Enforcement asking for clarification.

Crawley Playground

Despite the new Covid-19 restrictions the Playground will stay open. Five youths had been seen on CCTV spraying drinks on to the playground equipment. The Vice Chair said she will speak to them when she sees them again.

Grass Cutting Contract

Two potential bidders have now been shown around the sites. At the time of the meeting one bid had been received.

This year the Parish Council will be distributing 215 boxes of biscuits to residents who are over retirement age.

The Parish Council has not received replies to emails sent to CBC regarding outline costs for a residents parking scheme, flooding and overgrown footpaths in Newlands Road. The Parish Clerk was asked to chase these issues up again with our Ward Councillors. The recent pictures of flooding shown in the Parish News will be used to add weight to our request to get CBC to fix this problem.

The Parish Council has successfully completed its 2019/20 Audit.

The 2021/22 budget is likely to be discussed at the next December Parish Council meeting.

The Parish Council will be making a formal response to the Luton Airport consultation regarding increasing the number of passengers every year.

Yule or Yuletide is a festival that was originally observed by the Germanic and Anglo-Saxon peoples. Scholars have connected the original celebrations of Yule to the Wild Hunt of the God Odin (Woden). Later, Yule was Christianised. Many present-day Christmas customs and traditions such as the Yule log, Yule singing and others originally come from pagan Yule traditions.

It was originally a fertility festival to welcome back the Sun King, held on the winter solstice, the shortest day and longest night, which usually falls on or around 21st December. The following days would start getting longer and the earth would start getting warmer, so crops would begin to prepare for growth. It was also a time for rejoicing and making merry and for friends neighbours and family to get together. In Roman times, Saturnalia was the equivalent winter celebration, celebrating the Emperor as a god along with Saturn their chief god. It was a time of partying, over eating and drinking and was the day when slaves were given the day off and allowed to rule over their masters.

Christmas trees and Yule logs stem from Germanic tradition. The Yule Log was originally lit by the remains of last years hearth fire and was also a symbol of rebirth. Over time that tradition fell by the way side and the chocolate covered Swiss Roll became popular. While a fir tree was cut down and brought in to the house to be decorated and lit as a symbol of fertility.

The Christmas cards we now exchange were a Victorian invention and the giving of presents became popular. In fact in Europe, the Scandinavian countries exchange their presents on Christmas Eve, while the rest of Europe exchange theirs on Christmas Day, this is except for the Eastern Orthodox community who give their presents out on January 1st St Basils Day (or Agios Vasilis). In fact in Greece, where I lived for many years, Christmas is hardly noticed and Easter is their biggest Christian celebration.

Here in England our custom of decorating Christmas trees started during Queen Victoria's reign, as her consort Prince Albert is credited with bringing the first Christmas tree. The large Christmas tree that is in Trafalgar Square is a gift from the people of Oslo, Norway as a thank you for our support in World War II and has been an annual gift since 1947, although the first one arrived in 1942.

The Mistletoe was a plant sacred to the druids it had no roots, they believed it was a gift from the gods and was used in medicine as a cure. Kissing under Mistletoe was regarded as a good luck and as a fertility rite to help conceive a healthy baby. Pine Trees, Holly and Ivy were all regarded as symbols of life as they stayed green all year round. The Holly was also sacred because of its red berries. While the ivy was sacred as it was like the Fir tree green all year round.

Finally in modern Germanic speaking areas and some Scandinavian countries, Yule denotes the Christmas holiday season. Examples include jul in Sweden, Denmark and Norway, jól in Iceland and the Faroe Islands, joulu in Finland, Joelfest in Friesland, Joelfeest in the Netherlands and jõulud in Estonia.

Gardening Notes by Russell Sprout

It's nearly Christmas again and what a strange and disruptive year it has been. I hope that by the time you are reading this we have come out of lock-down for the second time and that we can all have some semblance of a normal festive season. If the weather is dry, continue digging vacant ground and finish tidying up beds and borders. If you haven't done so already clean and lubricate mowers before putting away for the winter.

Prune climbing roses now, cutting away diseased or damaged growth and tie in any new shoots to their support. Prune older flowered side shoots back by two thirds of their length. Start to winter prune your Wisteria, cutting back summer side shoots to 2 or 3 buds. Leave the faded flower heads on your Hydrangeas until the spring, they will provide frost protection to the swelling buds further down the stems

Remove fallen leaves from alpines and rockeries, fork over between plants with a hand fork and remove weeds. Examine dahlia tubers, if shrivelled plunge in tepid water overnight and if any are starting to rot cut off damaged part and dust with flowers of sulphate. Spray fruit trees with a tar-oil winter wash this month or next to kill eggs of pests laid earlier in the year. Tar-oil can be sprayed on all fruit except strawberries. Keep a check for mice damage amongst stored fruit and vegetables and also amongst autumn sown peas and broad beans and take appropriate action.

Recycle as much waste as you can on the compost heap and burn any woody matter that won't break down, but check carefully for hibernating hedgehogs before starting a bonfire.

Damp, leading to botrytis mildew, is the major problem in the greenhouse, so ventilate on dry days and reduce any watering to the absolute minimum. Lag outdoor taps and drain hoses and spray guns until dry to prevent frost damage. If we have heavy falls of snow this winter knock the snow off the branches of trees and shrubs to prevent them from breaking under the weight of the snow.

The seed catalogues are available now but remember, it is first come first served so get that order in as soon as possible. Remember when comparing a modern F1 hybrid against an older open pollinated type that the F1 will always mature in the same week, whereas the open pollinated varieties will crop over several weeks.

The allotments in Slip End were due to close at the end of September but have had a stay of execution until next September, the only positive thing to come out of covid! There has been a lot of pilfering this year which has been very upsetting for the people affected. So I would ask everyone to respect the hard work that allotment holders put in and leave their produce alone. If you don't have an allotment you should not be in there unless invited by one of the allotment holders who should be present with you.

Well it's time to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, see you in February



A Message from St Andrew's

Jesus understands

The Bible says that Jesus was made to be like his brothers and sisters. He is able to sympathise with our weaknesses because he has been tempted in every way just as we have. He became like us, he came to share with us in our experience of life.

It looks as if we are going to have a very strange Christmas this year. Family sized turkeys without the usual family gatherings to enjoy them, Carol services without being able to sing any Carols.

One of the Carols we probably would have sung and will probably listen to is: Once in Royal David's City. This includes the words, "Day by day like us he grew; he was little weak and helpless; tears and smiles like us he knew; and he feeleth for our sadness, and he shareth in our gladness."

In his Son Jesus, God takes upon himself the limitations and struggles of ordinary human life. This is what we celebrate at Christmas. That in Jesus He was willing to lay aside his majesty, his sovereignty, all the riches of heaven to become as weak and helpless and vulnerable as any new-born infant. Or any of us during the restrictions and uncertainties of the pandemic!

Right from the start Jesus knew isolation and insecurity. The fact that Mary was found to be expecting a child before she was married would have been extremely isolating and traumatic for Mary, and without Josephs support she would have been at risk of being stoned for adultery. They lived in an occupied state and the Census demanded by the Romans meant that they had to travel, by donkey or foot about 100 miles, right at the end of her pregnancy. Then of course there was no hospital, or midwife, or even an inn waiting for them, they would have been pretty much alone. That was not the end of their troubles, the puppet King Herod, got wind of a new King being born and commanded the death of all the boys under two. The family had to flee to a foreign land to live an insecure and isolated life as exiles.

Jesus was born into a dangerous, unstable and cruel world. Yet he grew up to trust in his heavenly Father. The one difference between Jesus and us is that despite the difficulties and temptations of his earthy life, he never sinned, he managed to walk with love and courage, and obedience to God, throughout them all. However he doesn't judge us – he comes alongside us to help us.

And so the great thing about the Christian faith is that we worship a God who doesn't stand aloof from our troubles but comes down and shares with us in them. Jesus had so much to deal with throughout his short life that he is able to sympathise with us in our weakness, our struggles, our difficulties in life. Although obviously his unique life experience can't be exactly the same as our unique life experience still he has great understanding of our human condition. This can give us huge

strength and comfort.

He is with us, he empathises with us and yet he is able to lead us forward and show us a way to live in faith in the midst of our difficulties.

To experience this, all we need to do is to turn to him and ask him for help. Although we will hugely miss the usual ways of celebrating Christmas we don't need to lose our experience of this message of Christmas.

So I wish you a Christmas full of Jesus presence and may God be with us all as we move into what will hopefully be a New Year in which we begin to come through the challenges of the pandemic,

At the start of the pandemic we were concerned that we might struggle to keep pace with requests for shopping and prescription collections, especially as some of our regular volunteers were in the vulnerable group and had to take a step back. All face to face appointments ceased which was a good thing from our point of view because I don't think anyone would have been happy to offer a lift back then.

Fortunately quite a few people came forward to volunteer on a temporary basis because they had been furloughed and this allowed us to keep pace with the requests coming in which were fast and furious to begin with. Things did calm down over time, in part because the government food parcels started to arrive and gradually people were able to get slots with the supermarkets to deliver their shopping, and in some cases families stepped up their support where they were able to do so.

Things are much calmer now and although some people are getting face to face appointments again we have been able to cope so far. A lot of the temporary volunteers are now back at work but we were extremely grateful for their contribution, and some of our regular volunteers are back on board now. We have gained three new volunteers from those who volunteered on a temporary basis initially which is great. One area that we could do with some help is taking the phone calls requesting help and finding a volunteer to do the job, if you think you would like to have a go then please do contact us, you can do this by using the helpline number – 07513 372 415, or contact one of the committee.

Sadly, we have lost several clients during this period – Susan Ball, Roy Thomson, Tom Reid, Mary Wildman and Marjorie Aldous, their names may be familiar to some of you. As far as we know none of them were COVID-19 related.

Just to give you some idea of the number of jobs we have done during this awful pandemic:

March to June 161 Jobs July to October 115 Jobs

For 62 different people, some existing clients and some new because they were told to shield.

We have been unable to do our regular tea parties at the village hall this year which are extremely popular and we know from feedback that clients have missed them, as we all have. Let us hope we will be able to commence again in the not too distant future.

Let us hope that a vaccine is found soon and we can all get back to some sort of normality!




