The latest Parish Council Meeting was held on Monday 3rd April in the Village Hall.

There were no Planning Applications to discuss this month.

Parish Council Grants

FoSELS – The Parish Council received a Grant Request of £1,978. It was agreed to seek further clarification from FoSELS and the Application will be discussed again at a later meeting.

Community Improvement Fund

The Hanging Baskets are ready to be installed in the Parish. Some baskets are having to be replaced with troughs due to the weight on some lamp posts.

Fly Tipping

There have been two incidents of fly tipping at St Andrews Church. They were captured on CCTV, a copy of which will be forwarded to Central Beds Council.

Highways & Footpaths

The chicane on Grove Road has been damaged and this has been reported to Central Beds Council as a matter of urgency.

Parish Trees

Old School Walk – The Parish Council felt the best course of action was to remove the fir trees and cut back the Silver Birch. However it was agreed to consult with residents prior to the work taking place.

Crawley Close – The cherry tree is dead and needs to be removed for safety reasons. Our Gardening Contractor, Lansdowne Services, has very kindly offered to replace the tree free-of-charge in honour of Queen Elizabeth II. The Parish Council accepted the very kind offer.

Report from Central Bedfordshire Councillors

Parish Councillors expressed their concerns about the flooding that recently occurred at multiple locations throughout the Parish. It was requested that Central Beds Council look at this as a matter of urgency. It was requested that, if re-elected, Cllr. Collins reports back within 3 months with a Central Beds Council plan, including timescales, for remedial work to take place.

Note: The next Parish Council meeting is on Monday 15th May, after the local elections have taken place and after the extra bank holiday.

GARDENING CLUB

There was a change to the normal gardening topics for the March meeting.

Maria Ellis gave a presentation on The Great Exhibition 1851. It was very interesting and informative as members had heard of it but did not know many details. (See photos of Maria and The Great Exhibition)

Construction started in Hyde Park on 7 September 1850, opening 1 May 1851 and closing 15 October 1851. The Crystal Palace was 1851 feet long and the Great Transept 108 feet high. Three of Hyde Park's elm trees were contained within. There were 13,937 exhibitors, one of which included a model of Liverpool docks with 1600 miniature ships.





There was a regular daily crowd of 50,000. A quarter of the country's 22 million people visited. The entrance fee for the first two days was a pound, then 5 shillings (25p) until 22 May when the price would be a shilling (5p) except on Fridays two shillings and six pence (12.5p) and

Saturdays five shillings (25p). Over 827,000 people paid a "penny" to use the WC's at the exhibition!!

Thomas Cook organised excursions in conjunction with Midland's railway. One estimate suggested he was responsible for over 165,000 people visiting the exhibition.

Profits from the exhibition were used to buy land for the V & A, Science, and Natural History museums, The Royal Geographical Society, The Royal Albert Hall and the Imperial College of Science and Technology.

The annual programme of garden visits under the National Gardens Scheme is to be prepared and hopefully will be available within the next month.

Message from St Andrew's

May is the month when we see bluebells in the woods around our beautiful Parish. They are amongst my favourite flowers, possibly because I think of them as heralding my birthday!

The Bible reveals the importance of nature. For example, there is a tree at the beginning and the end (Genesis and Revelation). And important stuff happens in lakes, rivers and up mountains – come to that in the wilderness. St Francis believed that the world was his cloister because all nature revealed the good news of God. I firmly believe that God speaks to us through nature. One may not be a church goer or a Christian, but still have a spiritual reaction of awe and wonder at the beauty of creation.

For those of us who pray, but have met a stumbling block, St Teresa of Avila recommended that we turn to nature: "Go to some place where you can see the sky, and walk up and down a little." It sounds a little like "forest bathing" or the Japanese practice of "shinrin yoku", a natural way of being calm and observing nature as a way to boost health and well-being.

I would like to share a poem I came across as part of my Lent reading this

year. It is by Gideon Heugh from Tearfund.

Anxious for the world on a spring morning There is pink in the sky, the blackbirds are singing; and the plants are throwing forth new green. Understand this: the ripening buds on magnolia and camellia are not mere hints. Yes the planes are bellowing overhead; yes the boney rope of terror is tightening around the world; yes my soul is battered and weary and I am hardly without blame.

Yet the trees are silhouetted

against quite the shade of blue;



Gardening Notes by Russell Sprout

Hopefully by the time you are reading this the weather will have settled down and we will be having some warm, dry days so we can get on in the garden.

Daffodils, tulips and hyacinths will need dead heading as they finish flowering and if they need to be removed to make way for other plants replant them very close together out of the way and let them die back gradually.

Dahlias can be planted out from the third week of this month when we should be finished with frosts. Don't be too eager to put those bedding plants and hanging baskets out either for another week or two.

Roses will come under attack and are best sprayed with a systemic insecticide which is absorbed by the plant and into the sap stream killing greenflies that feed on the sap. Alternatively spraying with soapy water will also get rid of greenfly but has to be done on a regular basis. Check for black spot or mildew and spray if necessary. Remove rolled up leaves containing tortrix caterpillar or sawfly grub and destroy (but don't put them in the compost heap). Gladioli need to be kept weed free and a good mulch 2 inches thick will keep the moisture as the plants depend on dampness at the roots to flower well. If you have any alpines trim those which have flowered to prevent seeding and prolong flowering period.

Hostas are in leaf now and will need some form of slug protection as they can devastate plants in a very short time. Be aware that slug pellets can be dangerous to other animals and don't scatter them where dogs or cats may try to eat them. There are several alternatives to slug pellets, you could try crumbled egg shells, the slugs get stuck to them and don't like it, a small bowl containing beer which they drink and then can't get out again, you can also use bran flakes (not the breakfast variety) which again they stick to and will avoid for that reason. Chrysanthemums can go in about the second week in May and stake tall varieties as you plant them. In the border pompoms and Koreans should be planted 12-18 inches apart in each direction, as these grow they will bush out and fill in the gaps.

Lawns will benefit from a light nitrogen feed at this time of year, it comes as liquid or granulated fertilizer and will give your lawn a lush green appearance. Make sure the blades are sharp on your mower and if the weather is dry leave about an inch of growth to stop the lawn from drying out and going brown. If planning a new lawn cultivate now, leave rough for the summer and sow in the autumn.

Make further sowings of herbs such as chervil, dill, fennel, hysop and parsley for culinary use. Keep an eye on the weather and be ready to cover potatoes if frost is forecast. Erect runner bean frames and plant seed from



the second week of the month. Marrows, courgettes, squashes and pumpkins can be sown outdoors from the third week of the month. French beans can be sown from the second week, continue sowing lettuce, beetroot and carrots for a fresh supply of tender young vegetables. Sweet corn can be planted towards the end of the month $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep and 18 inches in each direction, preferably in a square to aid pollination.

A layer of grit in the top of flower pots will reduce the amount of water evaporating and lessen the amount of water required to keep plants healthy. Cut off dead flower heads and thin out weak shoots from shrubs that have finished flowering. Remove dead wood and thin shoots to keep old forsythias shapely.

CADDINGTON AND SLIP END BUS USERS' GROUP

(CaSeBuG) - Update

As mentioned last month, CaSeBuG is made up of a group of villagers who have recently joined together to try and promote, monitor and improve public transport in the Caddington and Slip End area. The members of the group are concerned by the depletion of the bus services to our villages and are actively trying to improve the situation. However unless the numbers of people who use the service increase substantially it is an uphill task. We also have had to take into consideration the existing Central Bedfordshire constraints on budgets, and limitations on bus companies' service provision.

We are having regular meetings to discuss the situation and do what we can to improve the situation regarding the lack of bus accessibility to and from our villages. We send reports to both Caddington and Slip End Parish councils. This is a précis of one of our reports:-

The monitoring of the 230 service continues, and it has been found to be working very well. It is also attracting higher usage than the previous 231 service.

CaSeBuG primary activity has been focussed upon revising the 232 service, whose contract is up for renewal in May this year. As the current service is interlinked with the 74 service also operated by Dial-a-Ride, both services have had to be considered simultaneously.

Our proposed plan suggests a Saturday service together with a revised 232 route to replicate that of the old 231 route after serving Caddington (i.e. via Manshead) which we hope will receive a positive response from both the Central Bedfordshire Council Transport Officer, and from the Parishioners of Caddington and Slip End.





Caddington W. I



At the time of writing, our preparations were well underway for St. Georges's Day. Caddington Village had events all afternoon. Our W.I. was providing food and drinks. Watch out for those Bacon Rolls!

We had a very interesting talk from Ann Ledger about Whipsnade Zoo from when it was formed until the present day. Ann had several pictures on screen from the beginning showing the visitors enjoying themselves with the animals. The very first zoo was in the 12th Century when Henry I ruled. This was in Woodstock., Oxfordshire. In 1800 Regents Park was opened Jumbo the elephant was there for 16 years. Jumbo was an extraordinarily large elephant and in 1865 Fineas Barnham took Jumbo on and sent him to America. He was exhibited in the Greatest Show on Earth. Jumbo died at 27 years after being struck by a train

There were several other famous men involved in the development of zoos and in 1931 some land was bought in the Chiltern Hills and an Open Air Zoo was opened. The Little Train called The Conqueror began. The White Lion (1933) is on two acres of land with 800 tonnes of white chalk we need to repair The Lion. Wallabies are there now apparently. There is a huge Conservation Project at ZSL Zoos i.e. Whipsnade and London.

Ann has spoken to us previously and we found this talk very interesting.

A visit to Bletchley Park is being made. This should be a good day. Our next meeting is on May 2nd with a talk on Lace Making. We will be toasting the new King with a Bucks Fizz and we will be wearing red, white, and blue. Do join us if you can.

We meet at The Caddington Sports and Social Club on the First Tuesday of each month and start at 7.30 p.m.
